FROM THE DESK OF THE PRESIDENT

There is so much to write about. Good news about JRLW in Leisure World, the bad news about the growth of antisemitism all around us and the terror in Israel.

I'll start with the good news. JRLW continues to grow in membership, as well as events. I hope you are enjoying our religious services, discussion and book review groups, movies, brunches and much more. These are all brought to you by wonderful and hard-working volunteers who support JRLW. I wish to thank them all. We encourage all our members to help spread the word about everything JRLW has to offer our Jewish community and encourage them to join JRLW so they will be able to take advantage of **all** our events.

The bad news is we continue to see the growth of anti-Israel, antisemitism and pro-Hamas rallies on the news every day. Israel is attacked by Hamas or Hezbollah every day. Israel is condemned on many news stations and by a handful of politicians for defending itself. Yes, civilian casualties are terrible, but they are a product of war. I try to keep my columns apolitical so you can draw your own conclusions.

How bad is antisemitism? According to CNN, quoting ADL sources, "Between 2021 and 2022, incidents of physical assault jumped by more than a quarter, with more than half targeting Orthodox Jews. Acts of vandalism surged by 51%, and harassment rose by 29%. Every fourth American Jewish adult, Orthodox or not, was targeted in an antisemitic incident ranging from physical attacks to remarks in person or online, a separate survey by the American Jewish Committee (AJC) published in February (2022) found."

As if that's not enough, you can do a quick search on Google for incidents closer to home. According to the Washington Post, Petula Dvorak, October 9, 2023: "Antisemitic incidents in the United States reached historic levels in 2022 — the highest since the ADL began collecting data in 1979, according to its audit. ...the Jewish Community Center in Fairfax County was covered in 19 swastikas overnight in 2018."

Pamela Nadell is remembering the words painted on a fence near her home in a liberal, diverse suburb of D.C.: "No Mercy For Jews." "We are definitely worried that here in the U.S. and here in our region," she said, "when something happens in Israel, we see it repeated here." She'll never forget when she came face to face with vandalism she didn't expect in America, let alone this region. In 2018, she saw swastikas and "KKK" scrawled all over the place where her family worships in Gaithersburg, Maryland, in the Shaare Torah Synagogue. Someone painted "Jews Not Welcome" on the

entrance sign to the campus of Walt Whitman High School in Bethesda. Hundreds of students walked out of class to protest the message.

What can we do? Be vocal about stopping antisemitism. Let them know that if colleges don't take action to curtail pro Hamas rallies calling for the extermination of Jews, that federal funding should be cut. Write your Congressional representatives and tell them to support funding Israel now and stop haggling over linking it to bills that do not affect Israel. It's not a Democrat or Republican issue that Israel needs help from the U.S.

As mentioned in previous columns, what we do here in Leisure World, thousands of miles away from the Hamas brutality, is to open our wallets and donate to Israeli charities. The money of course helps but it also shows that Jews in America support Israel.

I like to conclude with some thoughts from Rabbi Lord Jonathan Sacks. Here are a few of his thoughts on antisemitism:

"The appearance of antisemitism is always an early warning sign of a dangerous dysfunction within a culture, because the hate that begins with Jews never ends with Jews."

"Antisemitism is the hardest of all hatreds to defeat because, like a virus, it mutates, but one thing stays the same. Jews, whether as a religion or a race or as the State of Israel, are made the scapegoat for problems for which all sides are responsible. That is how the road to tragedy begins."

"Jews cannot fight antisemitism alone. The victim cannot cure the crime. The hated cannot cure the hate. It would be the greatest mistake for Jews to believe that they can fight it alone. The only people

who can successfully combat antisemitism are those active in the cultures that harbour it."

"Wherever you find obsessive, irrational, murderous antisemitism, there you will find a culture so internally split and fractured that if its members stopped killing Jews they would start killing one another."

My final thoughts for today: For the past 3000 years, we, as a people, have been able to survive. At times, it is/was difficult to be a Jew. We continue to be a light to the world on ethical and just behavior. Israel remains a beacon of religious tolerance. With the continued help from G-D, we, and Israel, will survive these chaotic times.

CATHERINE THE GREAT

Part 2 of 2

The Polish-Lithuanian Commonwealth, created in 1569, a large, multiethnic country with relative religious tolerance, attracted migrants from Western Europe, including many Jews.

The Commonwealth government and its army, however, were weak and (as stated by Encyclopedia Britannica) "incapable of resisting territorial seizures." In 1772, 1792 and 1795, neighboring countries--- Russia, Austria-Hungary and Prussia---took possession of the land in three partitions. After the third partition, the Commonwealth ceased to exist.

On November 25, 1795, the King of Poland, Stanislaw August Poniatowski, under Russian military escort, left for Grodno where he abdicated. Catherine had a strong hand installing Poniatowski, one of her lovers, as King. He would spend his remaining days in St. Petersburg.

In his 1930 "History of the Jews," historian Abram Leon Sachar (who became the first President of Brandeis University in 1948) refers to the partition of Poland as "one of the great crimes of history."

Russia and Catherine II acquired most of the land (62%) and millions of Jews. At one time, Russia had the largest Jewish population of any European country, as many as 5 million (40% of the world's Jewish population), according to aish.com, website of an orthodox Jewish educational organization. The language spoken by 99% of the Jews in the Polish territory was Yiddish (according to the census of 1897).

Sachar referred to Catherine as "one of the ablest sovereigns in Europe." "She had a keen mind and an imperious will and was a shrewd judge of character." "...despite her liberal protestations Catherine's Jewish policy was "cruel and coercive." In 1792, she guaranteed their lives and religious freedom, but continued the restrictions, which had been in force under the Polish regime. Catherine turned the land into a western "colony" (later called "the Pale of Settlement"), forcing the Jews to live in

small villages (shtetls) and restricting their travels outside the Pale. Russia treated Jews as foreigners and prohibited them from traveling to traditional Russia, particularly Moscow, St. Petersburg and other large cities.

At times, Jews were forbidden to live in agricultural communities, or certain cities (such as Kyiv, Sevastopol and Yalta), and were forced to move to small provincial towns, thus fostering the rise of the shtetls.

Catherine's government issued a series of edicts, which restricted "the long established Jewish right to sell liquor, to keep taverns, and to participate in a number of other commercial enterprises." She prohibited Jewish merchants from trading in the inner provinces of Russia. Thus, she began to deny Jews everything which was not specifically permitted by the law, according to the Jewish Virtual Library.

Despite the oppression, some interesting developments came from the experience. Jews helped each other through charity--- "tzedakah," meaning "justice." As stated by YIVO Institute for Jewish Research: "The historian Martin Gilbert writes in his Atlas of Jewish History that no province in the Pale had less than 14% of Jews on relief, and Lithuanian and Ukrainian Jews supported as much as 22% of their poor population."

"Among the charitable societies organized by Jews were those to supply poor students with clothes, soldiers with kosher food, the poor with free medical treatment, poor brides with dowries, and orphans with technical education."

The Pale remained in effect until the Russian Revolution of 1917, following the abdication of Nicholas II. On March 20, 1917, the Russian Provisional Government issued a decree, abolishing religious restrictions.

Poland re-emerged as an independent nation after World War I under terms of the Treaty of Versailles (June 1919). Only 4,500 Jews currently live in Poland, according to the World Jewish Congress. Today, as a member of the European Union and NATO, Poland is better able to protect its borders.
