KEEPING KOSHER

The Hebrew word "kashrut" means "ritual suitability" and refers to the Jewish dietary laws, which are traceable to the Bible. These laws specify how to prepare, store, and eat food and how to slaughter animals permitted for human consumption.

These dietary laws assert that food from unclean animals or unclean creatures of the sea are not safe ("treyf"). Thus, fish and seafood without fins or scales (lobster, shrimp, crabs, catfish) are unkosher. Animals which do not have cloven hooves and which do not chew their cud (pigs, horses) also are "treyf."

The animals which may be eaten (cows, chickens) must be slaughtered in a certain way (quickly, painlessly, humanely) to be kosher. Only food that is marked or labeled with a "hecksher" (a certification symbol or stamp of approval) is "kosher" or fit for human consumption.

Additionally, meat and dairy products may not be mixed; and utensils used for meat may not be used for dairy and vice versa.

Approximately 22% of American Jews keep kosher in their homes, according to a Pew Research Center Study on American Jewish beliefs and practices in 2020. Nearly all Orthodox Jews (95%) kept kosher at home, accounting for most of the American total. 31% of Jews who identified as Conservative reported that they kept kosher, while 7% of Reform respondents followed the practice. Of American Jews with no particular affiliation, 10% kept kosher at home.

In Israel, as in America, nearly all Orthodox keep kosher. Of the non-Orthodox (few Israelis identify themselves as Conservative or Reform) 52% keep kosher at home, compared with just 14% of non-Orthodox Jews in America. As for pork (the ultimate kosher taboo), only 20% of non-Orthodox Israeli Jews said they eat it; for non-Orthodox Jewish Americans, pork consumption was closer to 65%.

In Israel, even the glue on the back of postage stamps is kosher, made from corn and not from pigs or horses. Self-adhesive stamps are taking over, but kosher stamps are still sold there.

Actually, the laws of kashrut were far ahead of their times. At present, consumer product health and

safety laws require certification by government agencies, indicating that foods, cosmetics and other products (baby foods, toys, infant cribs and strollers) are safe for public use. Also, private organizations issue certifications of quality or compliance with standards, such as the Good Housekeeping Seal of Approval, the Underwriters Laboratory Seal, and the American Dental Association Seal of Acceptance. Even used cars can be certified (but not by the Dental Association).

The number "4" is very important in Jewish tradition. There are the four "mothers," and on Passover, there are the "four questions" and the "four sons" (often the "four children" in newer Haggadot). I'm sure that most of you know these well and

can name each of these fours without looking them up. But did you know that Purim, which falls this year near the end of March, also has an important foursome known as the "four mitzvot?"

So, what are the four main mitzvot of Purim? If you'd like to try to come up with them on your own, cover the following section before checking out the answers.

- 1. The one I'll bet all of you got is known as MIKRAH MEGILLAH (the reading of Megillat Esther, the Scroll of Esther). It will first be read this year after Shabbat on the evening of March 23 and repeated during the morning service on Sunday, March 24. All are encouraged to bring groggers to services to drown out the name of Haman during the reading. It is the ONLY time during the Jewish year that we are encouraged to make noise during a service.
- 2. MISHTEH V'SIMCHAH (drinking and joy). In chapter 9 of Megillat Esther, Mordechai describes "y'may mishteh v'simchah (days of drinking and joy)." Many years ago, I learned of the custom to drink wine until one could not tell the difference between Haman and Mordechai. I never observed it, and given the abuse of alcohol that has become all too prevalent in recent times, let me suggest that each of us drink enough wine to feel good but not enough to lose control. Let's concentrate more on the Seudat Purim, the festive meal which is itself a joy.
- 3. MISHLOACH MANOT (sending of portions). It is a custom on Purim to send at least two portions of food and/or drink to at least one person. Even people who are poor are obligated to carry out this mitzvah. For many, it's customary to send a food basket to one or more people. The intent is to allow the giver to experience the joy of making someone else happy on this joyous occasion. It remains a wonderful custom to this day.
- MATANOT L'EVYONIM (gifts for the poor) One of my most vivid memories of my bubbe's kitchen was the pushke into which she put coins. Money

was tight, but she made sure to put coins into the pushke whenever she could. I'm sure many of you share that memory and some of you still have a pushke in your kitchens into which you make contributions. Hopefully, by the time the pushke is full, the total value of the coins produces a tidy sum for charity. This particular gift is non-specific. While it can be money, it can also be food, drink or clothing. In post-pandemic times, money is tight for a lot of people. Extra money, given to people that really need it, can make a huge difference. Let's hope that each of us can see fit to help those in need.

Wishing all of you a Chag Purim Sameach. Be well and stay safe.

Comedian Harmonists – Bringing together brilliant talent only to be destroyed by hatred and jealousy

I begin by admitting shamefully that I had no idea who the Comedian Harmonists

were and if Barry Manilow and Bruce Sussman had not written and produced this brilliant show, I would not know to this day. Al and I had planned to see this show on Broadway in March, but we heard that they were closing early on February 4, and we were able to get tickets for February 3. I have to say that it was probably in the top two shows in my lifetime that I felt would have been a "shandah" had we not seen it.

This group of six gentlemen sang close harmony and performed between 1928 and 1934; they were probably one of the MOST successful musical groups in Europe prior to World War II. Their combination of beautiful close harmonies and integrating some clever comedy earned them a huge following. As the 1930's approached, they were dealing with some heavy hitting trouble from the Nazi regime as three of the members were Jewish and a fourth married a Jewish woman. They were forbidden to sing together as the Nazi's came into power and there was no way that the group could continue to sing together with the dangers that were in store for the Jewish people.

This has been quite a year for Broadway acknowledging the atrocities toward the Jewish people. With the addition of Comedian Harmonists, I have also seen on Broadway Leopoldstadt and Parade. I am so proud of the producers, playwrights, and composers of these enriching productions bringing to the forefront the challenges that Jewish people have dealt with in America and Europe. Although these shows have closed, they have had sold out houses with audiences clearly moved and cheering the brilliant performances. Three Broadway shows in one year are an important reminder that awareness is the key to understanding. While we are dealing with the challenges of the war in Israel with Hamas and the often disappointing reactions of many factions of people toward Israel, it is

important for us to "celebrate" that the performing arts is an important outlet to bring perspective to our continued plight. I will be watching the Tony Awards this year and hoping that Chip Zien will win the Tony for his awe-inspiring performance in Comedian Harmonists. And I must acknowledge the "the calling" that Barry Manilow and Bruce Sussman had to see this show through 26 years of various productions to finally get it to Broadway. You can hear the "real" Comedian Harmonists if you have Amazon Music; their actual albums are there for your listening pleasure. YouTube also has a video of them singing together in 1931!

And in closing – just a reminder that Rabbi Fink, Shir Delight, and I will be looking forward to you joining us for our Purim Service on Sunday morning, March 24 at 10:00 am in the Activities Room in Clubhouse II. We will be in costume and will be doing our Guys and Dolls themed Purim shpiel as well as reading the Megillah. Please join us for hamentashen, groggers, and if you are able – wear a costume as we obliterate Haman's name together!!

Shalom dear friends,

My favorite holiday is coming up soon - Purim! This year, Purim begins Saturday night, March 23, and continues through Sunday, March 24. The festival of Purim commemorates the orchestrated salvation of the Jewish people in the ancient Persian Empire from Haman's plot "to destroy, kill and annihilate all the Jews, young and old, infants and women, in a single day." It is celebrated with Megillah readings, gifts of food, charity, feasting, and merriment. This is the holiday that we act silly, dress up in costumes, make up "goody bags" (Mishloach Manot) for friends, drink so much "good stuff" that we don't know the difference between Boo Haman and YAY Mordechai and we eat hamantaschen! What could be better?!

A few facts to share:

Purim Is a Persian Word. Purim means "lots" in ancient Persian. The holiday was thus named since the evil Haman had thrown lots to determine when he would carry out his diabolical scheme.

Mordechai was the leader of the Jewish people in Persia and Esther was his cousin. Forcibly made queen of Persia, Esther bravely interceded, putting her own life on the line on behalf of her people. The story of their heroism is recorded in the Book of Esther.

Purim is celebrated by observing the following four rituals:

- •Reading the Megillah which recounts the story of the Purim miracle.
- ·Giving monetary gifts to at least two poor people.
- Sending gifts of two kinds of food to at least one person.
- A festive Purim feast, which often includes wine or other intoxicating beverages.

Graggers are spinning noisemakers used to drown out Haman's name during the Megillah reading.

The sages of the Talmud assert that "a person is obligated to drink on Purim until s/he does not know

the difference between 'blessed is Mordechai and cursed is Haman." Obviously, this does not apply to anyone who may become ill, is underage or would act inappropriately when intoxicated.

On the day before Purim (or on the Thursday before, when Purim is on Sunday), it is customary to fast, commemorating Esther's fasting, with prayers.

Indeed, the day is celebrated with delicacies. Classic hamantaschen are a sweet three-cornered pastry filled with poppy seeds, chocolate, or the filling or your choice. In the Becker Kaufman household, we used to fill our hamantaschen with marshmallow fluff and peanut butter combined (don't knock it 'til you've tried it!)

People traditionally dress up on Purim, wear masks, or otherwise make themselves look somewhat unusual. Purim is observed on Adar 14, the day that the Jews rested after trouncing their enemies in battle. In the capital city of Shushan, there were so many bad guys that it took an additional day of fighting to ensure their safety, so they rested on the following day, Adar 15. Since Shushan was walled, it was declared that all walled metropolises (chiefly, but not only, Jerusalem) would celebrate on that later date. This second Purim is known as "Shushan Purim."

Purim is celebrated on 14 Adar and Passover starts on 15 Nissan. In a Jewish leap year there are two Adars, making for a total of 13 months. In those years, Purim is celebrated during the second Adar, so that it is close to Passover. This is so that the miraculous salvation of Purim is as close as possible to the miracle of the Exodus, commemorated on Passover.

However you celebrate this fun holiday, enjoy! Don't forget to come hear the megillah in the Purim celebration on Sunday, March 24 in Club House II. There is more info elsewhere in *this* Megillah.

Happy Purim – drink some wine, eat some hamantaschen, be silly! It's a mitzvah!

RECIPE CORNER

If it's Purim time, it has to be

HAMANTASCHEN!

1 cup sugar 1/3 cup oil 1/3 cup solid shortening 3 eggs

1/2 cup fruit juice or water

3 1/2 cups flour

3 tsp. baking powder pinch salt

1 can pie filling (I like cherry, but any fruit filling or poppy seed filling will do)

Cream sugar, oil and shortening. Add eggs and liquid. Mix well. Add dry ingredients and mix well. Roll out to about 1/4 inch thick on floured surface, about 1/3 at a time. Use a glass or round cookie cutter to cut into circles. Reroll the unused dough. Make circles into triangles by placing about a teaspoon of filling in the middle of each circle; fold up edges to form a triangle. Pinch the edges together. Wet the edges to make them stick together.

Place the Hamantaschen on a greased cookie sheet and bake in a 350° oven for 20 - 25 minutes. Cool on wire rack. Don't let the grandchildren pinch off the corners!

It will feature 140 in-patient beds and an out-patient clinic able to serve 250 patients a day. The center is now supporting the wounded from the war. Among the state-of-the-art advances the center will offer are walking labs which use computers to analyze motion and a therapeutic swimming pool with a modular floor that adapts to each patient's needs.
