many news stations and by a handful of politicians for defending itself. Yes, civilian casualties are terrible, but they are a product of war. I try to keep my columns apolitical so you can draw your own conclusions.

How bad is antisemitism? According to CNN, quoting ADL sources, "Between 2021 and 2022, incidents of physical assault jumped by more than a quarter, with more than half targeting Orthodox Jews. Acts of vandalism surged by 51%, and harassment rose by 29%. Every fourth American Jewish adult, Orthodox or not, was targeted in an antisemitic incident ranging from physical attacks to remarks in person or online, a separate survey by the American Jewish Committee (AJC) published in February (2022) found."

As if that's not enough, you can do a quick search on Google for incidents closer to home. According to the Washington Post, Petula Dvorak, October 9, 2023: "Antisemitic incidents in the United States reached historic levels in 2022 — the highest since the ADL began collecting data in 1979, according to its audit. ...the Jewish Community Center in Fairfax County was covered in 19 swastikas overnight in 2018."

Pamela Nadell is remembering the words painted on a fence near her home in a liberal, diverse suburb of D.C.: "No Mercy For Jews." "We are definitely worried that here in the U.S. and here in our region," she said, "when something happens in Israel, we see it repeated here." She'll never forget when she came face to face with vandalism she didn't expect in America, let alone this region, in 2018....

she saw swastikas and "KKK" scrawled all over the place where her family worships in Gaithersburg, Maryland, the Shaare Torah synagogue.... someone painted "Jews Not Welcome" on the entrance sign to the campus of Walt Whitman High School in Bethesda. Hundreds of students walked out of class to protest the message."

What can we do? Be vocal about stopping antisemitism. Write your Congressional representatives and tell them to support funding Israel now and stop haggling over linking it to bills that do not affect Israel. Let them know that if colleges don't take action to curtail pro Hamas rallies calling for the extermination of Jews, that federal funding should be cut. The school year is about to begin and so are the demonstrations. It's not a Democrat or Republican issue that Israel needs help from the U.S.

As mentioned in previous columns, what can we here in Leisure World, thousands of miles away from the Hamas brutality, is to open our wallets and donate to Israeli charities. The money of course helps, but it also shows that Jews in America support Israel.

Rosh Hashana starts Friday night, October 2nd and the Days of Awe is a time for Tzedakah.

"5774 was the year when it became dangerous to be a Jew. Israel, subject to sustained missile attack, discovered how hard it is to fight an asymmetric war against a terrorist group ruthless enough to place rocket launchers beside schools, hospitals and mosques. It found itself condemned by large sections of the world for performing the first duty of any state, namely to protect its citizens from danger and death."

"Antisemitism returned to the streets of Europe. 120 years after the Dreyfus trial, the cry "Death to the Jews" was heard again in Paris. 70 years after the Holocaust, the call of "Jews to the gas" was heard in the streets of Germany. There were times when it felt as if the ghost of a past we thought long dead had risen to haunt us. More times than was comfortable I heard Jews say, "For the first time in my life I feel afraid."

Rosh Hashanah 5768/2007

"This past year things have not gone easily for Jews, for Israel, or the world. In Britain there has been a continuing campaign of demonization against Israel. Elsewhere terror and violence have reduced entire countries to what Hobbes called "the war of every man against every man" in which life is "nasty, brutish and short". What is it that we are living through?"

Rosh Hashanah 5764/2003

"We enter the New Year, this year as last, poised between hope and fear. The situation in Israel remains uncertain. Elsewhere, antisemitism is on the rise. The international arena is still tense: neither the campaigns in Afghanistan nor Iraq have not ended the threat of terror of which the West has been aware since the attack on the World Trade Center two years ago. Individually, we live in an age of rapid and unpredictable change."

Rosh Hashanah 5762/2001

"The ten days that begin the Jewish year are a period of spiritual accounting. We look back and ask, "What did we do with G-d's most precious gift, the gift of time?" We do this personally as individuals, but we also do it collectively as a community. We ask G-d to remember the good, forgive the bad, and give us the inner strength to do better in the future. Where have we been as a community?"

Rosh Hashanah 5758/1997

"During these Ten Days of Teshuvah, may each of us reflect on what we can do to make this come about – and may 5758 be a year of health and blessing, peace and prosperity for you, your families and the Jewish people."

My (Joel's) final thoughts for today: For the past 3000 years, we, as a people, have been able to survive. At times, it is/was difficult to be a Jew. We continue to be a light to the world on ethical and just behavior. Israel remains a beacon of religious tolerance. With the continued help from G-D, we, and Israel, will survive these chaotic times.

Wishing you a Happy, Healthy New Year. And for those practicing Yiddish: "A gut gebentsht yohr," "A good and blessed year.

CANTOR'S CORNER

Michael Kravitz



At the end of August's column, I mentioned that my September column would discuss my first day as a seventh-grade Sunday School teacher for the Bethesda-Chevy

Chase Jewish Community Group. Here is the rest of the story.

When I arrived at the Hebrew Academy on 16th St. NW, I found out where my classroom was and checked out the books I would issue to the students in my class. I still remember the names of 18 of those students, and that may have been all the students who were in the class. I had prepared a talk, probably more like a college lecture, about what it meant to be Jewish. The students came into the classroom. I introduced myself, took roll, issued the books, and began my presentation. I went on for about 15 minutes, looked at the blank faces and realized it was not working. So, I stopped and said, "Okay, I want each of you to tell me about yourself, what you like to do, and what makes you tick." It was as if a cloud had been lifted. Each pupil rose to my challenge. Each one told me about himself or herself, some quite eloquently. I knew I had some bright students, and I saw that there was a genuine possibility that teaching this group could be a challenging and rewarding experience.

One of the books I issued was called THE RIGHT WAY. It had been written by Lillian Freehof in 1957 and was published by the Reform movement's UAHC (Union of American Hebrew Congregations). Each chapter started with a story to which an 11 or 12-year-old could relate. Questions at the end of each chapter involved Jewish ethics, often directly related to PIRKEY AVOT (the Sayings of the Fathers). I read this book from cover to cover as soon as I got it. The kids loved the stories and had some very animated discussions. The 2-1/4 hours of class time each week just flew by. This very positive experience made me think that the teaching profession might be right for me.

I never did apply to Law School. I did opt to take an additional year of coursework in Science at the American University, culminating in student teaching in Junior High science in the spring of 1970. I was hired almost immediately by Prince George's County Public Schools, and 2 years later, I transferred to Montgomery County, where I would stay for an additional 29 years.

However, I didn't forget those Jewish roots. I would continue to teach at the Bethesda-Chevy Chase Jewish Community Group Sunday School for 2 more years. I would join the staffs of Temple Sinai and B'nai Israel before branching off on my own to teach private classes of students looking to celebrate a bar or bat mitzvah. And I believe that it is likely that none of this would have happened if I hadn't taken that Sunday School job back in 1968.


But I did. And the rest was history.

I love the interchange in Fiddler on the Roof when the Rabbi is asked, "Rabbi, is there a proper blessing for the Tzar?!"

The Rabbi responds, "May G-d bless and keep the Tzar.....far away from us!"

I feel the same way about a niggun (or the plural – niggunim)! The definition of a niggun is a collection of repetitive sounds, i.e. bim bam, lai lai, yai lai lai, ai ai ai, etc. that are set to a melody. They can also be improvised on the spot, but the wonder of the niggun is that it can express joy, lamentation, anticipation, or any number of emotions that allow all to join in without worry that the lyric gets in the way of singing as a congregation.

One might ask, "Cantor, is there a niggun for this occasion?" I would assure them that there is and depending on the tempo and/or the melody used, one can join in song for a hora, a birth, a shiva, or any celebration or gathering which brings the participants together in spirit and song.

I learned a special niggun when I was at Hava Nashira, the spring gathering for cantors and Jewish music composers many years ago that had a special affect for me. The niggun started slow and began to build and became so joyous that I imagined that when I would get off the plane for my first visit to Israel, that this beautiful and exciting niggun would be a part of my exit from the plane to the tarmac. AND IT WAS! I absolutely sang this niggun upon my exit from the plane when I arrived in Tel Aviv.

Again, this beautiful and joyous niggun came to my mind and heart when I watched the plane arrive the evening of August 1, when the American hostages in Russia arrived at Andrews Air Force Base. Watching the impending joy and anticipation of the family, friends, and the President and Vice President waiting for the plane to land and then watching the former hostages deplane was an inspirational, and for me, "niggun-like" moment.

As we continue to gather for Shabbat, High Holiday, or any holiday gathering, please always feel free to

"niggun" your way through any of your favorite melodies! The lyrics are important, but the melody will enhance your experience whether you sing a lyric or turn the melody into a niggun!

SAVING CARNEGIE HALL – Part 2 of 2

When the Music Hall opened in 1891, a line of horsedrawn carriages formed for one-quarter of a mile, according to newspaper accounts. The crowd filled the Hall. Tickets cost only one dollar. Tchaikovsky earned approximately \$5,000 for his appearance (nearly a full year's salary at the time).

According to Carnegie Hall's website, violinist Isaac Stern mentioned to philanthropist Jacob Kaplan "something more should be done to save the Hall from demolition, and Kaplan agreed to fund a new effort—if Stern would be willing to spearhead the campaign. The violinist happily agreed."

Events moved quickly after Robert Simon announced the planned demolition on January 5, 1960. On January 10, 1960, Stern organized a small gathering of civic leaders in his home and created a committee to get the City of New York to purchase Carnegie Hall. Kaplan pledged \$100,000 toward the campaign.

Stern appealed to politicians and civic leaders; and he asked dozens of famous musicians to sign a petition in favor of saving Carnegie Hall, adding their signatures to thousands already gathered by earlier committees.

In April 1960, the New York State legislature passed the Carnegie Bill, allowing for its purchase by New York City. In May, the New York City Board of Estimate approved the purchase for \$5 million. In July, New York City took ownership of the concert hall and began a 30-year lease to the Carnegie Hall Corporation. Mayor Wagner appointed Stern as President of the corporation. Stern held the title and position for 40 years until he died of heart failure in New York in 2001 at the age of 81.

During that time, he continued performing and traveled to many countries, including Israel, where he discovered two outstanding young violinists, who he brought to America: Itzhak Perlman and Pinchas Zukerman.

Stern earned dozens of music awards, including 7 Grammies, the Kennedy Center Honor (1984), and the Medal of Freedom (1992). In 1997, Carnegie Hall named its main hall the Isaac Stern Auditorium.

History will remember him as the man who saved Carnegie Hall.

SWEET POTATO MASH

Marcia Crystal

- 1 Very large sweet potato
- 2 Teaspoons honey
- 1 Tablespoon margarine
- 1/4 Teaspoon lemon pepper seasoning
- 1/4 Cup chopped pecans
- 1/2 Cup miniature marshmallows (if desired)

Bake sweet potato in 400° oven until soft. Peel potato and cut into chunks. Place in bowl. Mash the potato and add rest of ingredients until well mixed. If desired, sprinkle marshmallows on top. Place in oven-proof bowl and return to oven 5 minutes. Serve warm. Enjoy!






