CANTOR'S CORNER

I've been invited to write a column that I'd like to call "Cantor's Corner" for the JRLW newsletter. This will be the first of what I hope will be many.

Some of you know that I appeared as a contestant on the television show JEOPARDY! February 14th of this year marked the 19th anniversary of the taping. I don't know where the years went – most of the details are still fresh -very fresh - and it seems like just yesterday that I was getting ready for the show.

I loved watching game shows as a kid, and when I was in high school, a game show produced by Merv Griffin appeared at 12 noon on NBC. It was called JEOPARDY! and its premise was that the contestants were given the answers – they, the contestants, had to come up with the QUESTIONS. It was hosted by Art Fleming, it was fast and it was fun. I decided then and there that I wanted to be on the show.

I took the test for JEOPARDY! in New York in 1969. It was a written test. I think I did okay, but I never got called. Then the show went off the air. When it came back in the mid-1980's, there was a new host named Alex Trebek. The format was the same, but there was a huge increase in the payouts. The value for each category was multiplied tenfold. The JEOPARDY! round in the old show had money values that ranged from \$10 to \$50. The new show started at \$100 and went up to \$500 with Double Jeopardy! twice that amount. I was liking it more and more.

My wife Cheryl and I decided to go to Los Angeles in the summer of 1988 for a vacation, and I made a reservation to take the JEOPARDY! test. I had heard, unofficially, that one needed to answer 35 (out of 50) questions right in order to go to step two which was a mock version of the game. If

a contestant got past that, he/she got to talk to the producers. Even getting to that stage was no guarantee of making it to the show. But, for every player who wanted to be on JEOPARDY,! that was the game plan, and I was one of many who sat down to take the test. It was 50 categories, 50 questions with a time limit. I didn't pass. The test I was given appeared 2 years later in a book called THE JEOPARDY! BOOK, a book that I purchased. I compared the answers to those I thought I had given. I needed 35 correct answers. I got 33.

For those who think that the written test for JEOPARDY! should be a snap because they get a lot of the answers right when they watch the show at home, let me say that nothing could be farther from the truth. The test is TOUGH. Many potential players are eliminated at this stage because the questions the producers use are the \$1800 and \$2000 point value questions from current game values. I would take the test again, in California, in 1989 and 1990. I failed each of those times, too.

Something would happen in late 1993 which would get me over the hump, and I'll share that story in my next column.

MedStar Pharmacy Can Help You Protect Yourself from Pneumonia

As is the case with many diseases, older adults have a higher risk of pneumonia than the general population. The U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention recently recommended that older adults receive two different vaccines to protect them from pneumococcal diseases - Prevnar 13 and the Pneumovax 23. Today we will discuss the first of these vaccines - Prevnar 13.

Prevnar 13 is a vaccine that protects against 13 various strains of Streptococcus pneumoniae, that is approved for use in adults 50 years of age and older. In adults, when the bacterium Streptococcus pneumoniae infects the lungs it can cause pneumococcal pneumonia. FDA's Center for Biologics Evaluation and Research, stated that according to recent information for the United States, "it is estimated that approximately 300,000 adults 50 years of age and older are hospitalized yearly because of pneumococcal pneumonia." The Prevnar 13 is an additional vaccine to the previous Pneumovax 23. While special cases exists, generally, the ACIP (Advisory Committee on Immunization Practices) recommends Prevnar 13 for adults 65 and older and has developed a schedule as follows:

- If a patient has never received a Pneumococcal vaccine: Administer Prevnar 13 first, then 6-12 months later administer Pneumovax 23
- 2. If a patient received Pneumovax 23 at 65 years or older: Administer Prevnar 13 at least 1 year after most recent dose.
- 3. If a patient started Pneumovax 23 series of vaccines before 65 years of age but now is 65 or older, Prevnar 13 is recommended at least 1 year later. The second dose of Pneumovax 23 will be given 6-12 months after the Prevnar

13 but no sooner than 5 years after the first Pneumovax 23 dose, which ever is greater.

The Prevnar 13 is given in the arm and commonly reported adverse reactions include injection pain, redness, and swelling. Prevnar 13 should not be given to anyone with a history of severe allergic reaction of any component of Prevnar 13 or any diphtheria toxoid-containing vaccine.



The medical team at MedStar Health at Leisure World have been working diligently to provide these vaccinations to the

PASSOVER KUGELS

MY FAVORITE KUGEL.....delicious

3 eggs

1/4 c sugar

2 c. Farfel or 4 matzo coarsely crushed

2 c. Cream style cottage cheese

1 c. Sour cream

1/3 c. Margarine or butter melted

1/2 c. Raisins

1/2 c. Apricot preserves.

Topping1/2 c. Finely chopped walnuts

2 tbs. sugar

1 tbs. cinnamon

In mixing bowl beat eggs until light, gradually beat in 1/4 c. sugar until fluffy. Soak farfel or matzo and drain. Add cottage cheese, sour cream, margarine, raisins and preserves to egg mixture, blend well. Fold in drained farfel or matzo. Turn into 12 by 7½ inch baking dish. Mix nuts, sugar and cinnamon, sprinkle atop mixture. Bake 350° oven for 40 to 45 minutes. Serve warm or cold. Makes 10 to 12 servings. Delicious

APPLE KUGEL

3/4c Streit's cake meal

3/4 c. sugar

t tsp. salt

1 1/2c. water

4 large apples such as Fuji, Golden

Delicious

1 Tb. lemon juice

4 eggs, room temp

1/4cup veg. oil

Heat oven to 350° Grease a 3 quart or 9x13 pan. Peel and quarter apples and slice them 1/4" thick. Toss with 1T lemon juice. Combine cake meal, sugar and salt.

Separate eggs. Mix yolks with water and oil till fluffy. Add dry ingredients and sliced apples.

Beat egg whites till stiff. Fold egg whites into apple/meal mixture.

Pour into pan and bake 1 hr. Remove from oven and let stand 10 minutes before serving.

RECIPE CORNER

DAIRY SPINACH KUGEL

1 cup frozen chopped spinach, very well drained
3 cups farfel soaked and drained
3/4 cup cottage cheese
small pkg cream cheese (3 oz)
4 eggs, separated
1 chopped onion
1/4 cup margerine
1 tbsp oil
salt and pepper to taste

While browning onion in 1 tbsp oil, drain spinach and farfel. Separate eggs. Beat whites until stiff. Melt margerine. Mix all ingredients except egg whites in large bowl.

Gently fold in stiff egg whites. Pour into a greased baking pan (I use the disposable aluminum 9x9 pan.) Bake in 350° oven for about 40 minutes. Serve warm. Enjoy



POTATO KUGEL

5 egg yolks

3 cups grated potatoes

1/2 cup grated onion

2 tbsps peanut oil

1 tbsp chopped parsley

1 tsp salt

1/4 tsp pepper

5 egg whites stiffly beaten

Beat yolks until thick and lemon colored.

Add grated potatoes. mix in grated onion, oil parsley, salt and pepper. Fold potato mixture into egg whites. Pour into greased 1/2 quart casserole or baking dish. Bake at 350° for 40 minutes or until crisp and browned.



REGIPE CORNER

SIMPLE APPLE MATZO KUGEL

4 sheets of egg matzo

2 cups apple juice

1/2 tsp salt

1/4 cup oil

2 apples, peeled, cored and cubed

3 eggs, beaten

1/2 cup sugar

1 tsp ground cinnamon

1/2 cup craisins

Break matzo pieces, soak in apple juice until soft. Drain well. In separate bowl, mix together eggs, salt, sugar and cinnamon. Add the soaked matzo and mix well. Fod in apples and craisins. Spoon into greased 8x8 baking dish. Bake in 350° oven for 45 minutes until nicely browned.

ACE SEMINARS SPRING SEMESTER

Tuesdays at Leisure World April 14 – May 19, Clubhouse I

1. Aspects of Israel: Complex & Beautiful 10:00am – 11:00am

This course will explore the many facets of Israeli society. Six different Israeli shlichim (emissaries) in our community will discuss – military experience, the land and its beauty, Israeli history, Israel as "Start-Up Nation" and the impact of the Israeli-Palestinian conflict on Israeli society.

2. Exploring Ultra-Orthodox Life in Israel 11:15am – 12:15pm

An examination of the Ultra-Orthodox sector of Israeli society through the lens of the Israeli TV series *Shtisel*. Shtisel won the Israeli Academy Award for Best TV Drama in 2014. See a different slice and gain some new insight into Ultra-Orthodox life. Facilitator: Ira Weiss, PhD, is a retired neurophysiologist and an avid collector of cinema related to Jews and Israel.

3. <u>Jewish Identity 1:15 – 2:15pm</u>:

This class will explore many complex issues surrounding who is a Jew, what impacts the strength of one's Jewish identity, especially the ever more fragile identity of our youth. Threats to Jewish identity and how Israel, social activism, and one's background plays into identity and inevitably the strength of the Jewish community. Each week will feature a different Rabbi or Jewish educator each with a unique perspective.



The Interfaith Committee of Leisure World will commemorate the Holocaust in its annual Yom Hashoah service Thursday, April 16, at 1:30 pm in the Activities Room of Clubhouse II. The keynote speaker for the event will be Gilbert Waganheim, a US Army Officer who was present at the liberation of the Mauthausen Concentration Camp. What he saw there will forever be engraved in his memory.

As is customary for the event, survivors of the Holocaust will participate by lighting seven candles and reading portions memorializing those who died in the camps. 


