FAMOUS MUSICIAN JOHN EATON CONCERT IN LW DECEMBER 7

The world renowned composer and musician John Eaton will perform at Leisure World in a partnership between the JRLW and JCCGW. The date is December 7, 2010 at 1:00 PM in the Clubhouse II auditorium. Tickets are available at the E&R office for a donation of \$15.00. Checks should be made out to JRLW.

John Eaton is a Washington D.C. pianist extraordinaire. Considered one of the foremost interpreters of American music, Mr. Eaton offers a unique combination of ultra-tasteful jazz and fascinating observations. Eaton has been performing professionally for more than 30 years. He was named to the Steinway Concert Artist roster in 1988.

From shows at smoky jazz clubs to a command performance in the East Room of the White House, he has appeared both as a soloist and with such legendary artists as Zoot Sims, Benny Carter, Clark Terry, and Wild Bill Davison.

For twelve years, Eaton has given more than 200 sold out lecture/concerts for the Smithsonian Institution on American popular song both in Washington, D.C. and around the country. The series was broadcast nationally on National Public Radio. He has taped a television series on American popular song and great American songwriters.

Among the great American composers he brings to life in his performances are Cole Porter, George Gershwin, Fats Waller, Hoagy Carmichael, Duke Ellington, and Harold Arlen.

Lending a hometown touch to the program will be the resident of Leisure World who will introduce Mr. Eaton. Ira Sabin, long a fixture on the music scene in Washington DC, will have the pleasure of opening the program. Washingtonians will remember Ira as a bandleader and drummer. Ira and his wife Irma live in Vantage Point West.

RECIPE CORNER

Ms. Cohen worked for many years as cook at the Hebrew Home. She says that this tuna dish was loved by all.

"Tuna Delish"

1/3 cup all-purpose Karo syrup (dark)

2 1-lb cans stewed tomatoes

½ med. onion, sliced (1/2 cup)

2 cups uncooked elbow macaroni

2 large cans tuna, drained

4 oz grated or shredded American cheese

Combine tomatoes, onion and syrup in large saucepan. Bring to boil, stirring constantly. Stir in macaroni. Remove from heat. Add tuna in large chunks and about two-thirds of the cheese. Pour into a 2-quart casserole. Cover. Bake in a 425° (hot) oven until macaroni is tender, stirring occasionally, for about ½ hour. Sprinkle with remaining cheese. Bake uncovered until cheese melts, about 5 minutes. Enjoy!

The Gift of Giving Doing Good for Others – Means Doing Good For You

to learn more about JSSA's broad range of services and programs. This month I would like to share a personal experience that shaped me growing up. My father enjoyed doing things for others. People liked and respected him. They also knew they could go to him to find a resource or a referral. Most important, he always said that his efforts on behalf of others came back to him two-or three-fold. And they did -- I saw it happen often over the years.

A comment by the chief rabbi of England, Rabbi Jonathan Sacks, develops this idea even further: "Beneath the clamor of selfinterest, a quieter voice within us whispers the deeper truth, that the greatest gift is to be able to give."

Doing nice things for others is both inspiring for the giver and the receiver. It makes you feel warm inside, like a warm cup of cocoa by the fire. Often small, simple acts of caring make a big impact. Consider, for example, simple things like dropping someone a short friendly note just because you were thinking of them, or cooking for a neighbor just because it makes you happy. How about inviting someone for coffee? What about introducing two people who don't know each other? Or smiling and saying hello to the next person who passes by.

A bit of reflection can help each of us discover how to make best use of our capacity as individuals to do good. Therefore, as a social worker, I encourage you to look inside yourself to discover ways you personally can do *mitzvot* by using your own experience, interests, knowledge or skills. What are *your* unique gifts and how can they make a difference for others?

For instance:

Do you drive? Offer to drive someone where they need to go. Find an organization that needs drivers to deliver meals or escort someone to an appointment.

Do you like to teach or share your interests/hobbies with others? Become a volunteer teacher and share your knowledge with children or other adults. Become a speaker for community groups on topics you know.

Do you knit? Find a community service project that donates handmade blankets for newborns or injured war veterans.

Does an ongoing volunteer commitment appeal to you? Local Jewish organizations are a great place to volunteer opportunities. instance, JSSA has many programs that home-bound seniors help in our community, including: friendly visitors and shoppers. JSSA Hospice trains volunteers to provide comfort, support and respite to hospice patients and their families.
