## PHYLLYS HUTT'S CORNER:

### OY, VEY! PAPA'S DEAD! SEND FOR THE PHOTOGRAPHER!

I never aspired to be a writer. An observer? Yes. A storyteller? That, too. But someday, if I ever do write the Great American Novel, this story will emerge from one of the back burners. Some stories seem to be too outlandish to be true, but you know what they say about truth versus fiction.

My father was the only child of Freda and Nathan Steinberg, born to his parents late in their lives. His father was fifty-something and his mother in her mid-forties at the time of his birth, extraordinary in those years when childbirth at that age was so dangerous. They were the lean years, where there were very few, if any, conveniences and pleasures. At the turn of the century, long before the era of the iPad, HD TV, cell phones, etc., that which had been available was mostly for the rich. Those who had a telephone "shared" it with neighbors and friends. And, of course, no one - - - but NO ONE - - - owned his own camera. If you wanted a photograph for any occasion, you either went to the photographer's studio or he came to your home. A photograph was a luxury.

When I was growing up, there was always a large, black-framed photograph of a rather stern-looking man, balding, with staring eyes, a thick, dark moustache, and possessing a rather scary countenance. My two sisters and I were quite intimidated by it. Over the years, it seems that this picture was not given much respect. In our house in Philadelphia, it was up against the wall in the coal bin. In another residence, it was in the garage, near ladders and cans of paint.....never in a place of prominence.

We children always asked my mother, "Who is that man and why do we have his picture?" The answer was usually something like a mumbled, hard to decipher, "Oh, yes, that's someone in Daddy's family" or "Ask Daddy who it is." Whoever it was, I thought, must have fallen into great disfavor in some way. Still, it was not tossed out until many years later, when Mom moved into assisted living, and there was hardly enough room there for the "good" pictures.

A tremendous ownership battle for the photo then ensued between me and my sisters, each of us demanding that the other take it. After tediously coaxing my mother, we managed to wrest the truth from her.

It seems that one afternoon Freda and Nathan were all dressed up and preparing to go to some social event, when all of a sudden Nathan collapsed. It was quickly determined that he had passed on. The thought suddenly occurred to Freda that she had no likeness of her husband, no memento, no keepsake, no way to remember his face. They had never gotten around to having a formal portrait done, not even able to afford one at their wedding.

Apparently, to Freda, there was only one way to handle this emergency, and since Nathan was all dressed up anyway, she took the only avenue left open to her at that time. "Oy, vey", she cried, "Papa's dead! Send for the photographer!"

And so the photographer, even though on short notice, came to the house, propped up Grandpa on a chair, and took a formal picture. Problem was that his eyes, of course, were closed. When the photo was developed, the photographer drew in dark eyes over the closed lids, which caused it to have a wild and unnatural appearance. Being an only child, my father was the recipient of this "inheritance", and it hung around our house literally and figuratively, for years. Although I regret it now, we reluctantly decided to let go of the past, and donate the gruesome likeness to charity.

That was when it went to Good Will Industries. I hope someone can at least utilize the frame.

Lucky Malamut

1 Large Challah, 7 Eggs, 3 Tbsps Maple Syrup, 2 Sticks Butter, 1 1/2 cups light brown sugar, 2 cups milk, 2 Tbsps vanilla, 1 9x13 pan

Melt butter, sugar and syrup in a bowl. Mix eggs, milk & vanilla in second bowl. Rip challah into pieces and lay in bottom of pan. Pour contents of both bowls over challah. Mix around and put back in flat shape. Cover tightly and refrigerate overnight. Bake uncovered at 350 degrees for 1 hour. Serve warm. Delicious!

## DEBBIE FRIEDMAN, JEWISH SONGWRITER, HAS DIED

Debbie Friedman, a popular singer and songwriter who is widely credited with reinvigorating synagogue music, has died. She died after being hospitalized in Southern California for several days with pneumonia. She was in her late 50s.

Debbie influenced and enriched contemporary Jewish music in a profound way. Her music crossed generational and denominational lines and carved a powerful legacy of authentic Jewish spirituality into our daily lives. She is best known for her composition "Mi Shebeirach," a prayer for healing that is sung in many North American congregations.

## **HELPFUL STEPS TO REDUCE DAILY WORRIES**

Throughout history, some of the greatest leaders and thinkers have been burdened by worrying. Julius Caesar said, "As a rule, what is out of sight disturbs men's minds more seriously than what they see." And contemporary poet Maya Angelou observed, "We spend precious hours fearing the inevitable. It would be wise to use that time adoring our families, cherishing our friends, and living our lives."

Worry is, in fact, a natural part of life. Our safety, happiness, financial security and relationships can cause many of us to fret. Yet, worries can take up too much time and negatively impact moods leading to a variety of aches and pains.

Yet some worries can spur us to act, creating what mental health professionals call healthy stress. Healthy stress increases the body's ability to remain alert and ready to perform well under pressure; i.e., making a split-second decision while driving.

These simple techniques can reduce anxiety.

**Talk out problems.** Turn to a friend, family member or a trained therapist. JSSA can send a therapist to your home if you are unable to get to our office.

**Make larger tasks smaller.** When working on a stressful task, break it into small steps. Completing each step will make you feel better. **Benefit from others' knowledge.** If you aren't sure how to get good information ask for help. Having a professional or an informed friend coach you and check on your progress can be a relief.

**Keep busy.** Engage in fun and relaxing activities that you enjoy. This helps distract you from your worries until you are able to tackle them.

**Set priorities.** Differentiate between large and small concerns. Make a to-do list, and act on your less stressful worries first to gain momentum.

**Learn to melt tension.** Deep breathing, visualization, light exercise, listening to music and being with people that make you happy are all good options.
