THE AMERICAN STUDIES ASSN. BOYCOTT

The American Studies Association (ASA) was founded in 1951. Its home-page states that it is the nation's oldest and largest association devoted to interdisciplinary study of American culture and history. None of my college friends or relatives is aware of its existence.

This January its membership voted by a twothirds margin to boycott Israeli universities and academic institutions on the grounds that Israel should "end human rights violations." I would like to partially quote from a January 19 column by Charles Krauthammer in the Washington Post, titled, "How to fight academic bigotry."

"For decades, the American Studies Association labored in well-deserved obscurity. No longer. It has now made a name for itself by voting to boycott Israeli universities, accusing them of denying academic and human rights to Palestinians.

Given that Israel has a profoundly democratic political system, the freest press in the Middle East, a fiercely independent judiciary and astonishing religious and racial diversity within its universities, including affirmative action for Arab students, the charge is rather strange.

Made more so when you consider the state of human rights in Israel's neighborhood. As we speak, Syria's government is dropping "barrel bombs" filled with nails, shrapnel and other instruments of terror on its own cities. Where is the ASA boycott of Syria?

And of Iran, which hangs political, religious and even sexual dissidents and has no academic freedom at all? Or Egypt, where Christians are being openly persecuted? Or Turkey, Saudi Arabia or, for that matter, massively repressive China and Russia? Which makes obvious that the ASA boycott has nothing to do with human rights. It's an exercise in radical chic, giving marginalized academics a frisson of pretend anticolonialism, seasoned with a dose of edgy anti-Semitism.

And don't tell me this is merely about Zionism. The ruse is transparent. Israel is the world's only Jewish state. To apply to the state of the Jews a double standard that you apply to none other, to judge one people in a way you judge no other, to single out that one people for condemnation and isolation - is to engage in a gross act of discrimination." Mr. Krauthammer and his wife have managed to bring a world famous musician, Evgeny Kissin, to perform at the Kennedy Center on February 24. Mr. Kissin, a Russian Jew became an Israeli citizen on December 7, declaring: "I am a Jew, Israel is a Jewish state...Israel's case is my case, Israel's enemies are my enemies, and I do not want to be spared the troubles which Israeli musicians encounter when they represent the Jewish state beyond its borders."

I have heard from several Jewish organizations including the JCRC, about the boycott by ASA of Israeli academic institutions. Several colleges, including the University of Maryland, American and George Washington University, have publically denounced the boycott.

What can we do? We can write our legislators and the colleges and universities we have attended. We can strongly urge them to condemn the action of the ASA. When anti-Semitism reaches this level **again**, something must be done to stop it. What will you do?

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What's Cooking in the Kitchen?

Baked Zucchini Sticks (parve) Prep Time: 10 minutes Cook Time: 30 minutes Yield: 12-18 sticks

Ingredients:

- 3 medium zucchini, washed and sliced into 3" sticks
- 1 large egg (or egg white only), slightly beaten
- 1/2 cup breadcrumbs, mixed with garlic powder, paprika, salt, freshly ground black pepper according to taste
- cooking spray

Preparation:

1. Preheat oven 400°F. Line cookie sheet with parchment paper and spray with non-stick cooking spray.

- 2. Set up three dishes:
 - 1) cut zucchini slices;
 - 2) beaten egg; and
 - 3) spiced bread crumbs

3. Dip zucchini sticks into egg then into bread crumbs. Place the breaded zucchini slices on the cookie sheet in a single layer. Spray breaded slices with cooking spray.

4. Bake at 400°F for about 25-30 minutes, or until cooked through and golden brown.

A TRIBUTE TO ARIEL SHARON

Ariel Sharon, Larger than life Sunday, January 12th, 2014

Ariel Sharon, who died Saturday at age 85, after being suspended comatose, between life and death for the past eight years, was the final Israeli prime minister from the generation that fought in the 1948 War of Independence.

And as with others of his generation, the growth and development of the country were reflected in his career.

Sharon was a dazzling military commander. He was one of the original authors of Israel's trailblazing counter terror strategies. The large battles against regular armies that he commanded in the 1956 Suez campaign, the 1967 Six Day War, and the 1973 Yom Kippur War are still taught in military academies around the world for their tactical brilliance.

Sharon was a risk-taker. The most prominent shared quality of his military battles and his political ones was that they were always over high stakes. As a general, Sharon's gutsiness paid off in spades more often than not. As a politician, the results were less impressive.

His two big gambles as a political leader were the 1982 invasion of Lebanon, and the 2005 withdrawal from Gaza. Although the results of both actions were mixed, Israel could have won the gains it made in both at far less cost, if it had not gone along with Sharon's plans.

Perhaps the most notable way in which Sharon's life is a reflection of his country, at least outside of Israel, is that the blood libels published against him in the Western media are of a piece with the overall slander of Israel in the European and US mainstream media.

Like Israel as a whole, Sharon saw his good name dragged through the mud by the Western media with tales published against him against which he had no means of defending itself. Sharon's powerlessness was exposed in the libel suit he filed against Time Magazine for a 1982 article in which the magazine alleged that Sharon had planned the massacre of Palestinians in Sabra and Shatilla refugee camps by Christian militiamen. When the jury rendered its ruling, it declared that although the story was false, Sharon had no right to monetary damages, because although the story was a lie, the lie was not actionable.

As Prime Minister, Sharon was caricatured as a baby eater, as a Nazi, the murderer of Jesus, and a hook nosed, greedy Jew. In the hours following the announcement of his passing, he was libeled repeatedly by such outlets as the BBC. And as was the case throughout his life, and throughout the life of Israel, so now after he has died, the libelers will pay no price for their misdeeds.

Sharon was one of the warmest, most engaging political leaders Israel has ever seen. He had an infectious sense of humor, a true love of life, of Israel, and of Israelis that made even his greatest Israeli critics like him.

Sharon was larger than life. His accomplishments and failures were similarly outsized. And while much of what happened to him, particularly at the hands of the media, reflects the larger predicament of all of Israel, there can be no doubt that Ariel Sharon was one of a kind.

The Rape of Europa tells the epic story of the systematic theft, deliberate destruction and miraculous survival of Europe's art treasures during the Third Reich and the Second World War.

The movie is presented by JRLW and the Coming of Age Program.

In a journey through seven countries, the film takes the audience into the violent whirlwind of fanaticism, greed, and warfare that threatened to wipe out the artistic heritage of Europe. For twelve long years, the Nazis looted and destroyed art on a scale unprecedented in history. But young art professionals as well as ordinary heroes, from truck drivers to department store clerks, fought back with an extraordinary effort to safeguard, rescue and return the millions of lost, hidden and stolen treasures.

The Rape of Europa begins and ends with the story of artist Gustav Klimt's famed Gold Portrait, stolen from Viennese Jews in 1938 and now the most expensive painting ever sold.

Today, more than sixty years later, the legacy of this tragic history continues to play out as families of looted collectors recover major works of art, conservators repair battle damage, and nations fight over the fate of ill-gotten spoils of war.

Art found in Germany Linked to Nazi Looting (November 3, 2013, NY Times)

Works by Matisse, Picasso and Chagall are said to be among a collection of 1,500 pieces of art found in Munich, according to BBC News and the German magazine Focus. The works were reportedly confiscated by the Nazis during the 1930s and '40s and, if confirmed as genuine, would be among the largest recoveries of looted art with a possible value over \$1.3 billion. The stockpile was discovered by chance in 2011, when tax investigators obtained a warrant to search the home of Cornelius Gurlitt, the son of the art dealer Hildebrand Gurlitt. There are international warrants out for at least 200 pieces in the collection, which is being stored in a secured warehouse in Munich. It is unclear why the discovery was not publicly reported until now. The United States Holocaust Memorial Museum estimates that the Nazis seized about 16,000 works of art in all, according to **BBC News**
