SHOLOM ALEICHEM



FILM “SHOLEM ALEICHEM: LAUGHING IN THE DARKNESS”

One of the great writers of the Jewish world will be the featured subject in the film “Sholem Aleichem: Laughing in the Darkness,” to be shown here in Leisure World January 30th. The film is co-sponsored by JRLW and the JCCGW Coming of Age Program in the auditorium of Clubhouse II at 1:30 PM. Tickets are available from E&R. Checks for \$6.00 per person should be payable to JRLW.

“Sholem Aleichem: Laughing in the Darkness” is much more than a documentary biography of “the Jewish Mark Twain,” as the creator of Tevye the Dairyman, Menachem-Mendl and other beloved folkloric characters has been called. It is a rich, beautifully organized and illustrated modern history of Eastern European Jewry examined through the life and work of the author, born Sholem Rabinovich in Pereyaslav (near Kiev) in 1859. The film, directed by Joseph Dorman, explores the history and dissolution of Eastern European Jewish culture and the conflicting desires of later generations to remember and to forget. In the late 19th century Jews were second-class subjects in czarist Russia

and convenient scapegoats in times of social and political unrest; any dreams they had of assimilation were shattered by periodic pogroms.

The rural Jewish culture of the shtetl was further eroded by the Industrial Revolution and World War I and finally wiped out by the Holocaust. One of the film’s central themes is Sholem Aleichem’s personification of the tug of war between nostalgia for the past and the impulse to leave it behind.

The movie reveals that Sholem Aleichem was every bit as colorful a figure as the characters in his stories. In his stories, his fantasy of riches, voiced by Tevye, boiled down to a five-word wish, “If I were a Rothschild.” In “Fiddler on the Roof,” the hit 1964 Broadway musical based on the Tevye stories, it became the song, “If I Were a Rich Man.” Many of his stories, which turned difficult situations into high comedy and farce, were tales of generational conflict told from the parents’ point of view.

Sholem Aleichem’s work explored one question “How to adopt to modernity and yet not lose the continuity of a civilization that was Jewish. Clearly the answers given by Sholem Aleichem 100 years ago cannot be the answers today. But what we can learn from him is how to negotiate an answer. Or even how to ask the question.

FDR AND FOUR FREEDOMS, THEN AND NOW

FDR and the Four Freedoms will be the highlighted subject of the program by Professor Allida Black scheduled for January 9th at 11:00 am in Clubhouse I. The “Four Freedoms” - freedom of speech, freedom of worship, freedom from want and freedom from fear - gave the Allies, and eventually the world, a new vision that empowered them to oppose fascism, communism, dictatorship and economic tyranny. This vision spurred the creation of the United Nations, the Universal Declaration of Human Rights, as well as social and political movements at home and around the world.

Professor Black’s presentation is co-sponsored by JRLW and the Coming of Age program of the JCCGW. Tickets are available in the E&R office for \$6.00, payable to JRLW.

Franklin Roosevelt was elected president for an unprecedented third term in 1940. Much of Europe had fallen to the advancing German Army and Great Britain was barely holding its own. A great number of Americans remained committed to isolationism. In his Annual Message to Congress on January 6, 1941, Franklin Roosevelt presented his reasons for American involvement, making the case for continued aid to Great Britain and greater production of war industries at home. President Roosevelt stated that the United States was fighting for the universal freedoms that all people possessed.

The “Four Freedoms” - the freedom of speech, the freedom of worship, the freedom from want

and the freedom from fear - symbolized America’s war aims and gave hope in the following years to a war-wearied people because they knew they were fighting for freedom.

Join in the discussion of the steps FDR and Eleanor Roosevelt took to develop the concept, what shaped their commitments to it and assess its impact on our lives today.

Professor Allida Black is Executive Editor of the FDR4Freedoms Digital Initiative, an education and advocacy program dedicated to the “Four Freedoms.” In addition to being Research Professor of History and International Affairs, Black serves as Founding Editor and Editorial Advisory Board Chair of The Eleanor Roosevelt Papers, a project designed to preserve, teach and apply Eleanor Roosevelt’s writings and discussions of human rights and democratic politics. She is a director of the Roosevelt Institute and its Four Freedoms Center. Professor Black is also a member of the Board of Directors of the Eleanor Roosevelt Legacy Committee.

Recipe Corner



Winter is the time for a good pot of soup. Here is Shirley Greenberg's recipe for a hearty, good soup.

CABBAGE/GARLIC BORSHT

2 or 3 cloves minced garlic
3 bunches of beets, grated
1 head of cabbage, shredded
Marrow bones
Sour salt or lemon juice to taste
Salt, pepper and sugar

Salt down shredded cabbage; let stand for about $\frac{1}{2}$ hour and then squeeze out liquid and drain. Place cabbage and marrow bones in bottom of heavy pot. Cover with water and cook for $1\frac{1}{2}$ hours. Skim film from liquid. Add grated beets and all seasonings. Cook for another $\frac{1}{2}$ hour. Season to taste. Soup always tastes better when reheated.

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Debunking the Myths of Older Adult Falls

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Many people believe that falls are a normal part of the aging process. This is fact more myth than reality. Most falls can be prevented – and you have the power to reduce your risk. Exercising, managing medications, having your vision checked, and making your living environment safer are all steps you can take to prevent a fall. To promote greater awareness and understanding about older adults and falls below are 10 common myths – and the truths – about older adult falls. This is the first half of a 2-part article. The second half will appear in next month's Newsletter.

Myth 1: Falling happens to other people, not to me.

Reality: Many people think, "It won't happen to me." But the truth is that 1 in 3 older adults – about 12 million – fall every year in the U.S.

Myth 2: Falling is something normal that happens as you get older.

Reality: Falling is not a normal part of aging! Strength and balance exercises, managing your medications, having your vision checked and making your living environment safer are all steps you can take to prevent a fall.

Myth 3: If I limit my activity, I won't fall.

Reality: Some people believe that the best way to prevent falls is to stay at home and limit activity. Not true. Physical activities will actually help you stay independent, as your strength and range of motion benefit from remaining active. Social activities like participating in Com-

ing of Age in Maryland are good for your overall health.

Myth 4: As long as I stay at home, I can avoid falling.

Reality: Over half of all falls take place at home. Inspect your home for fall risks. Fix simple but serious hazards such as clutter, throw rugs, and poor lighting. Make simple home modifications, such as adding grab bars in the bathroom, a second handrail on stairs, and non-slip paint on outdoor steps.

Myth 5: Muscle strength and flexibility can't be regained.

Reality: While we do lose muscle as we age, exercise can partially restore strength and flexibility. It's never too late to start an exercise program. Even if you've been fairly inactive your whole life, becoming active now will benefit you in many ways – including helping to prevent falls.

IDF IN CONCERT

On Tuesday, December 13, we had the privilege of attending a concert given by young adults who are part of the Israeli Defense Forces. Those of us who attended were treated to singing, playing and dancing by these young people.

This was a fund-raiser for the Friends of the Israeli Defense Forces. Although we know what danger the people in the IDF face – in fact the danger that the whole country of Israel – faces daily, these young people sang most of the songs so joyously, you forgot the danger of their real mission for a few hours. One of the young men, just age 23, was depicted in a short film. He was in charge of a platoon of 18-year olds. It is hard to imagine the responsibilities that young man has to shoulder. Then this soldier came on stage and told us of a friend who was killed while they were patrolling a border town. The whole audience was overwhelmed. What impressed me the most was how much courage these young people must have.

In Israel all 18-year olds (except for the ultra Orthodox) must serve 3 years in the Defense Forces. Then, if they can afford it, they attend college. The Friends of the IDF collect funds so they can support these men and women. They do this by providing the combat soldiers facilities in which they can relax and forget, for a few days, what they have been through, perhaps a week of vacation, helping with scholarships and in many other ways. As we were told: the Israel Defense Forces support the people of Israel and the Friends of the IDF support the Defense Forces.

The concert ended with the soldiers and others who joined in dancing and singing their way up and down the aisles of the auditorium. If you didn't know better, you could have been celebrating at a wedding or a Bar Mitzvah. What a joyous ending to the evening. Those of you who chose not to go really missed out on a very special event.
