# BEREAVEMENT CARING FOR THOSE IN NEED

Recent events have been a reason to investigate services available to JRLW members when a spouse has died. Checking at the Interfaith Chapel, we found that there is an existing bereavement group limited to ten people a session. We endeavored to find a source that will be there for Jewish residents. We are fortunate to have as a new resident and member Ellen Sirkis, who is a volunteer with Hospice Caring.

The death of one's spouse is the most stressful event that occurs in one's life. In addition to the social and emotional burdens, this predisposes one to physical illness. We know that grieving is hard work and everyone grieves differently and for different periods of time.

Hospice Caring offers bereavement services free of charge. Trained facilitators lead the peer support groups. They meet weekly in safe comfortable environments convenient to the group members. The groups are specifically tailored to those grieving the death of a spouse, a parent or an adult child. Group specific peer support strengthens the bond and understanding among group members.

It surprises some people that there are moments of humor in the Hospice Caring groups. The mixture of tears and laughter reflects the reality of the present and the hope for the future.

# What's Cooking in the Kitchen?

### **Green Pea and Mint Soup**

1 small yellow onion peeled and chopped

1 Tablespoon olive oil

4 cups frozen peas thawed --or- -fresh peas

4 cups chicken stock -or- vegetable stock

1/4 teaspoon black pepper

1cup fresh mint leaves – firmly packed

1 teaspoon salt

Saute onion in olive oil over medium heat for 6-8 minutes (until soft not brown). Add - peas, stock, salt, and pepper; cover and bring all to a boil.

Lower the heat and simmer for only another 1-3 minutes. Allow the peas to be heated, but not cooked for so long that they lose their color.

Take soup off the heat and add mint. Puree the soup using an immersion blender or regular blender.

Reheat as many times as necessary.

For cold soup set in refrigerator for at least 4 hours before serving.

Do Not freeze this soup.

Serves 6.



### SANDY HOOK – ONE YEAR LATER

Our nation listened and watched television in horror as the terrible events were revealed. troubled young man entered the elementary school and randomly shot students and teachers. He had a gun. We were in a state of shock. All those innocent people killed. 
