As many of you know, Idell Corson and I enjoy the honor of representing the JRLW on the Leisure World Interfaith Committee for the Homeless and Working Poor (CHWP).

As your representative, I want to take this opportunity to thank the JRLW for the very generous monetary contributions we make to the CHWP on a yearly basis. Though CHWP is strictly volunteer, the money is used to offset necessary cash outlay. One example: each Monday of the year we purchase ham, cheese, bread, cereal and give milk money cash to the homeless men's shelter in Rockville. This shelter houses up to 200 men of all ages. Last year, we made 5,200 sandwiches for the shelter.

In August, we have our school supplies drive and in October our annual Caps for Kids and Coat Drives. Please think of CHWP and Caps for Kids when you pull out your knitting baskets!

We also invite you to become a CHWP volunteer. You can see firsthand how vital our LW CHWP is to the many communities we serve.


October our fashion show by "The Look", November a speaker and in December our annual card party featuring our members' kugels.

CANTOR'S CORNER

I still hear from a number of JRLW newsletter readers about how much they enjoyed the columns on my JEOPARDY! experiences. So, as I think about what to include in a given column, I look to see if I can incorporate an answer-question combination applicable to the subject. And the July column gives me the perfect opportunity to do just that. So we'll start with the category and the answer – you come up with the question.

THE GREAT SEAL OF THE UNITED STATES

Answer: The stars on the Great Seal can be interpreted to form the shape of this Jewish symbol

I'll place the question further down in the column to give those who want the chance to think about it. While there is no proof that placing the stars in this way was intentional, there is speculation that it MIGHT have happened as a tribute to the man who is given credit by many for helping to finance the American Revolution – a Polish-born immigrant named Haym Salomon.

Haym Salomon was born in Leszno (Lissa), Poland in 1740 into a Sephardic-Jewish family which had left Spain after the Spanish Inquisition of 1492. He would travel through western Europe as a young man and would acquire a knowledge of finance as well as a fluency in several languages. He would come to New York City in 1775 where he established himself as a financial broker for merchants engaged in overseas trade. He also joined the Sons of Liberty. Arrested as a spy in September, 1776, he would spend 18 months on a British boat as an interpreter for Hessian mercenaries sympathetic to the British cause. In 1778, Salomon was arrested again, sentenced to death, but managed to escape and made his way with his family to Philadelphia. He resumed his financial activities as a broker and in 1781 began working with Robert Morris who had recently been appointed the Superintendent for Finance for the Thirteen Colonies. Between 1781-84, Salomon's fundraising

and personal lending helped raise a sum of money equivalent to just under \$17 million 2013 dollars. His most important financial effort came just before the Battle of Yorktown in August, 1781. The Colonial Army under George Washington, with help from French troops under Rochambeau, had trapped Cornwallis and the British troops, but lacked food, uniforms and supplies to finish the campaign. When Morris met with Washington to tell him that the \$20,000 in 1781 dollars (about \$519000 dollars in 2013 currency) that Washington had requested was not available, Washington gave Morris a four word order "SEND FOR HAYM SALOMON." Salomon raised the \$20K by a sale of bills of exchange, and Washington would force Cornwallis' surrender at Yorktown in what would be the final battle of the American Revolution. Following the war, it is thought that Salomon personally gave money to people he considered unsung heroes who had become impoverished during the Revolution. All this activity took its toll on Salomon and his personal finances. When he died of tuberculosis in 1785 at the age of 44, his personal fortune had been exhausted and his family was left penniless.

There is a legend that George Washington asked Salomon what he wanted as payment for his contributions to the American Revolutionary War. Salomon is said to have replied that he didn't want anything for himself but wanted something for his people. Thus, the thirteen stars, if the legend is to be believed, were placed in the shape of a Star of David (Mogen David) on the Great Seal. So, the JEOPARDY! question you should have stated is "What is the Mogen Dovid (Star of David)?" I'll give you credit for Hebrew or English.

Let me wish you all a happy Fourth of July, and when you think of the heroes of the American Revolution, include the name of the Polishborn Jew who helped make it possible.



"IN SEARCH OF ISRAELI CUISINE"

In Search of Israeli Cuisine is a portrait of the Israeli people told through food. It puts a literal face on the culture of Israel. Profiling chefs, home cooks, farmers, vintners, and cheese makers drawn from the more than 100 cultures that make up Israel today – Jewish, Arab, Muslim, Christian, Druze a rich, complex and human story emerges.

Through scenes that are mostly cinema verité interviews. farms. markets. restaurants. kitchens, landscapes, history—audiences will discover that this hot, multi-cultural cuisine has developed only in the last 30 years. In that short time, Israel went from being one of the poorest countries in the world to one of the most advanced. Its sophistication mirrors the current state of the Israeli people and their food: secular, outward looking and innovative.

The chef/guide of **In Search of Israeli Cuisine** is **Michael Solomonov**, the James Beard award winning chef/owner of Zahav and a number of other restaurants in Philadelphia.

BDS: WHAT IS IT AND WHY SHOULD WE CARE?

BDS is a movement that is spreading throughout the college campuses in the United States, Canada and Europe. BDS stands for Boycott, Divest and Censure. The BDS movement continues to make strides in its campaign to delegitimize the State of Israel. The movement is gaining increased support on campuses around the world as it promotes initiatives on local and national levels calling to divest and boycott the Jewish state.

BOYCOTT: Boycott any products made in Israel. This includes boycotting by individuals as well as companies.

DIVEST: Companies are asked to divest any investments or close any branches currently operating in Israel.

CENSURE: Countries and the UN are encouraged to censure Israel because of the bad treatment of Arabs residing there.

This movement was started by Israel's enemies. If successful, Israel's economy will be crushed. The BDS movement is targeting college students to take up their cause. The students are presented with a scenario of poor Arabs being taken advantage of by big, bad Israel. It started with boycotting all things manufactured by Israel on the Left Bank. Then it continued to all products made in Israel. The fact that many Arabs earn their livelihood by working in Israeli factories is overlooked. If the BDS movement becomes successful, these Arabs will be out of work.

Ireland, Holland and Sweden are among the countries who have declared that BDS is protected by the right to free speech. Some universities here in the United States have formed committees to condemn Israel and endorse BDS.

Why should we care? I believe that this boycotting of Israeli products is another form of anti-Semitism. Israel is the single country that has been censured more times than any other country by the UN. Already we have seen that in several European countries products from Israel must be prominently labeled as originating from Israel. Where will this lead?

What can we do? If you have grandchildren in college, speak to them about BDS. Ask if it is active on their campus. If they are aware of such a movement, discuss with them what can be done.

When you are shopping, look for products made in Israel and buy them. If you need one, buy two.

If you have investments in Israeli firms, keep them. Do not allow this movement to fool you into divesting your investments.

We must not let BDS succeed. The very life of Israel may depend on our actions. If you think I may be exaggerating this issue, Google BDS on your computer and see for yourself. Go to their homepage and see the language. See the pictures of hate against Israel and the Jews.

AM YISROAL CHAI!

UPDATE: June 4, 2016 - An unprecedented show of support for Israel took place in the United Nations with more than 2,000 students, pro-Israel activists and diplomats gathered in the General Assembly Hall for the largest anti-BDS assembly to date.

RECIPE CORNER

TUNA FISH/CORN PATTIES

Tired of tuna fish salad? Try this recipe for tuna corn cakes for dinner or as a fun summer party appetizer!

Ingredients:

2 cans of tuna fish
2 Tbsp. chopped green onions
1 egg, beaten
½ cup drained canned corn
¼ cup milk, low fat
½ cup yellow cornmeal
2 Tbsp. all-purpose flour
½ tsp. baking soda ¼ tsp. pepper
1 Tbsp. chopped fresh cilantro
1 Tbsp. canola or peanut oil
Salt to taste

Directions: Place tuna in medium bowl. Add onions, egg, corn and milk; blend together well. In a small bowl, combine cornmeal, flour, baking soda and pepper. Add to the tuna mixture and blend well. Stir in cilantro. (mixture will be wet and thick) Heat oil in a medium skillet until hot. Drop by spoonful onto hot skillet and pat down to flatten. Cook approximately 1-2 minutes on each side (until browned and cooked through; may require additional time if thicker patties). Serve with shredded cheese and sour cream if desired.

TORAH PORTION FOR JULY 9 KORACH

JRLW will hold Shabbat Services on July 9, at 9:15 am. The Portion for that day is Korach. Here is a summary of that Parsha.

The Portion is called Korach, after the leader of the rebellion against Moses and Aaron. (In addition to Korach, who – like Moses and Aaron – was a Levite, the other ringleaders were Datan and Aviram of the tribe of Reuben.) Korach gathered 250 leaders of the Israelite community and asserted that all members of the community were holy. If so, he asks, by what right did Moses and Aaron raise themselves above the rest of the people? Moses responded by telling Korach and his followers to come to the Tent of Meeting the next day in order to offer their fire pans in sacrifice to God – in a kind of incense-making contest. God would make known who is holy.

The next day, at the Tent of Meeting, Korach's 250 followers prepared their fire pans as Moses had directed. When they had prepared their sacrifices, God caused the earth to open up and swallow Korach and his followers. Then God sent forth a fire which consumed the copper pans in which the sacrifices had been placed. Eleazar, Aaron's son, made the now-charred copper fire pans into plating for the altar, a reminder to all who looked at the altar to avoid offering incense to God unless they were proper priests.

The following day, members of the community appeared before Moses and Aaron, blaming them for the deaths of so many people. God became angry and sent a plague to wipe out the entire community. Aaron offered a sacrifice on behalf of the people, but by the time that God accepted the sacrifice, thousands of people had already died from the plague.

God then instructed Moses to take a staff from the chieftain of each of the twelve tribes and to place all of the staffs in the Tent of Meeting. God would choose one of the staffs and cause it to sprout. The next day, Aaron's staff sprouted, bearing blossoms and producing almonds – a sign that the tribe of Levi was the tribe selected for the priesthood.

This Torah portion also focuses on the responsibilities, rights, and privileges of the Levites as priests. Specifically, God tells Aaron he will not have any territory or land, but that all of the donations and gifts that the Israelites bring to God - meal offerings, the best oil, wine, grain, first fruits of each harvest and all first born animals - will belong to him and his family. First born male children are also to be offered, but they can be redeemed - that is, purchased back - by their families for five shekels. (This is the origin of the ceremony of pidyon ha-ben, the buying back of the first born male, which we still observe.) The Levites are then to offer one-tenth of each tithe to God. The offering to God is to be the best portion of whatever the Levites receive.






