EDITORIAL

I sat there horrified and heartbroken, staring at the television, unable to turn it off, the day the riots came to Baltimore.

Horrified at what I was seeing. Young people in their teens or early twenties throwing broken bits of cement at the police; hooded people walking in one door of CVS and coming out the other door carrying CVS bags filled with I-don't-know-what. These were not hardened criminals. These were teens coming up to the camera to show what they had done and what they were going to do. Didn't they know that by showing their faces on television they could be easily identified by the police? I don't think they even had that in mind. They were enjoying themselves, grabbing and throwing. When they were finished taking everything they could from the CVS, they burned the building. Forty percent of the Baltimore police force is black. The young people were rioting about a perceived wrong by whites by throwing things at policemen of their own color.

I was thinking, "Where are their parents?" when I saw a mother come up and grab her son, yelling at him and dragging him away from the scene. I thought, "Good for her!" She was later admonished by the Washington Post pundit because she 'beat' her son. I was astounded when the reports came in showing people who had taken lawn chairs into the intersection--right in the middle of the intersection--and sat down to watch the show!

Of course, a wrong had been done that needed to be addressed. But not this way. Where were peaceful demonstrations? Where were the black leaders like Al Sharpton? Where were the black people to whom these youngsters would listen?

Then there were the pundits with their columns in the Washington Post who said the

riots could be traced back to financially poor families; or that there was lead in the paint where these people had lived when they were young. Phooey! I know many people of my generation who grew up poor and didn't turn to robbing and throwing rocks at policemen. Lead paint was in most homes. These cannot be excuses.

But, wait. Why am I writing about this in a newsletter of a Jewish organization? Here we are in a safe enclave, probably a half hour from where the action was taking place. I can quote passages such as "What happens to the least of us happens to the most of us." Or, "Am I my brother's keeper?" I could go on. But the real reason, at least to my way of thinking, is that we Jews are charged with Tikkun Olam. We are held responsible for healing or mending the world. When there is something so terribly wrong, it is our responsibility to try to help.

We can sit back and be smug because our children would never be part of this Baltimore action. But we can't be certain, can we? Perhaps the young people in Baltimore were encouraged by adults. Certainly, the media could be charged with aiding and abetting, eager to show the world what was going on there.

Why did these people feel the need to demonstrate so violently? Perhaps the first step needs to be an open dialogue. Perhaps moral behavior should be taught as early as pre-school. Let us be part of the solution, not part of the problem.

A black person was wrongfully killed by the police. That was proven. But, please God, show us a way to correct all of this without violence. Let us Jews be a part of the healing. Please.

It is that time of year when you have to join or renew your membership in Jewish Residents of Leisure World.

There are many reasons for belonging to JRLW. We have religious services: once a month we have Friday evening Shabbat Services; once a month we have Saturday morning Shabbat Services. After these services we have refreshments and a social hour where you can visit with old friends or make new friends. On the Saturdays that we do not have services, Rabbi Samber holds a short service and a Torah study. We have services on all of the major Jewish holidays. On Rosh Hashannah and Yom Kippur we have both Conservative and Reform Services. We have Yiskor Services five times a year. This year we started a tradition of having a Women's Shabbat service led by the women of JRLW.

We hold a Passover Seder, which is especially nice for those of us who do not go to a relative or friend for the occasion.

Once a year we have a Malavah Malka--saying good-by to the Sabbath.

We hold an annual Israeli celebration observance.

We are the umbrella organization for all of the Jewish organizations here in Leisure World.

We partner with the Jewish Community Center of Greater Washington to have movies monthly, and the yearly Health Expo.

We sponsor series of classes in Judaic topics.

We are the largest organization in Leisure World; and we offer all kinds of ways to connect with other Jewish people living here.

CANTOR'S CORNER 3

When I hadn't heard from JEOPARDY! by February, 1995, I decided to go through the contestant process one more time. I had saved the tape I made a year earlier, and I played it over and over on the way to Atlantic City for the 3-minute/10 question qualifying test. Once again, I was sharp by the time I arrived. I was seated in the testing room almost immediately. I quickly scanned the questions once the clock had started and realized that 3 of the 10 questions were based on information that was on my tape; and that I knew those answers. In addition, a fourth question in the OPERA category was to name the opera that made its debut on NBC television on December 24, 1951, and I owned a copy of the record made from that production. A fifth question in LITERATURE was one I could answer because I had seen the movie based on the book and for which I owned the movie soundtrack. So, I only needed 2 of the remaining 5 questions to pass. I completed the test and went downstairs to wait for the names of people who had passed the test to be called. It was torture listening to a whole bunch of names other than mine – the list of names ended with “AND MICHAEL KRAVITZ.” I went back upstairs to get the date for my return to Atlantic City. I was given a date in April to take the 50-question test and, hopefully, play the mock game and talk to the producers.

When I returned in April, Glenn Kagan was back to oversee the testing process. I called out “hello, Glenn,” when I walked into the convention center testing room. Several hundred hopeful contestants were present. The written test started at 10 a.m. I passed and was given a 3:00 p.m. come-back time. I walked into the room at 3:00 p.m. and Glenn was there. Once again, I said “hello, Glenn,” and he responded immediately with “hello, Michael.” I thought that was a really good sign. He'd seen a whole lot of people between the time the written test had ended and my coming back, and he remembered my name. I was in the first group of 3 people

to play the mock game. The JEOPARDY! team put out the categories and I couldn't believe what I saw. Three of the 6 categories were OPERA, BROADWAY and CHEMISTRY. I couldn't have picked 3 better categories had I been allowed to choose them myself. I was teaching Chemistry at the time, and those two music categories were among my strongest. It really was my lucky day. I ran the first 15 questions in those categories, got 1 of 2 in the ART category, and at that point Glenn said “Michael, I want you to put down your signaling device so I can hear how the other players sound when they ring in.” I thought this, too, was a very good sign, and I left Atlantic City fairly confident that I would hear back from JEOPARDY!

The summer came and went, the fall came and went, New Year's Day 1996 arrived and still no word from JEOPARDY! I had resigned myself that if I didn't hear from them by February 1, I would try the process once again. On Friday, January 5, I had finished teaching my chemistry classes when the phone rang in the chemistry office. The phone call was for me. I recognized the voice on the other end. “Michael, this is Glenn Kagan from JEOPARDY! Congratulations, you made the show.” Finally, the call I hoped would be coming. JEOPARDY! wanted me in California for a taping on February 14. I paused – that was the 15th anniversary of my mother's death on the Gregorian calendar. I thought about what she would have said and the first words that came to mind were “go get 'em, Michael.” I told Glenn I would be there and immediately made plans to step up the preparation process. I made a promise to myself that I would be ready to play when I got to California.

The story continues next month. And for those of you who wondered what the opera was that made its debut on NBC television on December 24, 1951, it was Giancarlo Menotti's AMAHL AND THE NIGHT VISITORS.

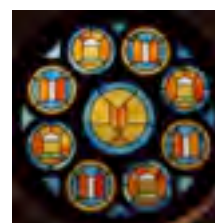


MAY RELIGIOUS SERVICES
