## **JRLW President's Message**

There has been a pattern in the United States of designating specific months as historical dedications to various groups within our society. The Lunar calendar shifts and Jewish holidays or events do not necessarily fall out in the same times each year in the secular calendar. This year the period of great Jewish pride and remembrance starts at the end of March and continues through April. This is a time when we should take great pride in our heritage and the contributions that the Jewish people have made to the world at large.

Passover is a wonderful time to rally everyone to the cause of freedom of religion and human rights, the right to live in an honorable, respectful society. Coming at the end of March and the first week of April, Passover is a time to recall the inhumanity of slavery and the negligence of rulers who do not recognize the rights of all humans to live with the same benefits and obligations as every other citizen. It is a time when we bring family together to repeat the story and the morals of the Passover experience – slavery in Egypt, discrimination because of religion, the killing of the first born males to inhibit the continued existence of the Jewish people, and delivery to a new life with the promise of everything that one would expect in a free and responsible society.

This is a story that has been the cradle for the development and growth of not only Judaism but the Christian faiths, and other major faiths around the world. It, in many ways, is the basis for modern civilization.

Following right behind in April is Yom Hashoah

April 11th, when we stand in silence and conduct programs to remember and honor the victims of

the Nazi Holocaust. The world experienced a rude wake-up call as to the extent to which racial and religious hatred and discrimination can take an otherwise educated and religious community. We stand together with our fellow citizens of all faiths to remember and to state the motto that arose from this disaster – Never Again; not to our fellow Jews or to other religious or ethnic groups around the world. The inhumanity of man against man cannot be tolerated and must be at the top of the agenda for every Jewish organization and individual.

Culminating this period is Yom Ha'Atzmaut April 19th, the celebration of Israel Independence Day. This is a day of great joy, for the Israelites have returned to the soil of their ancestors and once again have a nation of their own. It is a day when the Jewish soul has a place to rest without fear of pogroms, anti-Semitism, and discrimination. While not perfect, it is now the homeland for the Jewish people, a realization of the prayer recited through the ages, "Next Year in Jerusalem."

This is a time to be proud of your Jewish heritage. Whether you are Orthodox, Conservative, Reconstructionist, Reform, or an Agnostic, show pride in who you are.

## LEISURE WORLD REMEMBERS THE HOLOCAUST

For the two consecutive days of March 1 and 2, 2010 in the Crystal Ballroom, curators from the United States Holocaust Memorial Museum will be visiting Leisure World and joining with the Jewish Residents of Leisure World for the purpose of conducting oral histories, sharing the Museum's extensive photographic archives, collecting original documents, photographs and other artifacts, and updating and creating new records for the Survivor's Registry

With a coordinating committee chaired by Jackie Rabinow, volunteers have come forward to be interviewed and put their stories in the public record. They have completed questionnaires detailing where they came from, what their circumstances were during the war and other stories of their experiences during the Nazi domination of Europe. The volunteers are people in our midst who are survivors of the concentration camps or labor camps, a hidden child some of whom were raised as Catholics, participants in the Kinder Transport program, and those whose family left Europe because of the Nazis. Included in this project are the military men and women who entered the camps and later helped the victims to survive and are considered liberators. Of interest too are those stories about

the Righteous Christians who helped shelter and save the Jewish victims.

If you have not yet volunteered, there is still time. Contact Jackie Rabinow at 301-598-3672. Now is the time to record these memories so that the Holocaust does not become an asterisk in the history of our times.

A feature during the two days of interviews will be computer access and guidance for people who want to check on family members or friends who resided in Europe during the war and would have been victims or survivors of the Holocaust. The official registry is available and museum staff will be there to assist in tracking down and locating information. This data base has been greatly expanded since the German government and the Red Cross in the past year has released the voluminous archives captured from the Germans and maintained in Germany. If you wish to trace family or friends, visit the Crystal Ballroom during the two days. Or if you do not want to be interviewed but wish to register, the time is now.

The United States Holocaust Memorial Museum continues to build its collection of oral histories, original photographs, documents, and artifacts relating to the experiences of the. In order to continue to document the Holocaust accurately, authentically, and powerfully, the Museum seeks original material about the onset of Nazi terror, persecution and atrocities, the American and world responses, armed and spiritual resistance and rescue, liberation, and the reestablishment of life after the Holocaust. The Museum would appreciate the donation of any artifacts, photos or mementos that residents have retained from the period. Bring them to the Crystal Ballroom during the interviews.

## EMPTYING OUT

I've got to stop cleaning out drawers and closets! I find all kinds of things which make me wonder why I kept them. They evoke such deep emotions, from laughter to sorrow or guilt.....like the return card from a long past bar mitzvah which, somehow, never got mailed. Preparing to finally toss this accumulation, I happened upon some thoughts I had jotted down when my now-grown grandchildren were tots. They were getting ready to move far away from their house (which was around the corner from ours) to my son's new job, and, hopefully, a bright future. Our incentive to stay put having vanished, we had decided to move to Leisure World, and hold a combined yard sale. The following is my account of the day's event:

JULY, 1994. It is a stifling, hot morning and I have decided to stay inside with Noah, while the other family members are setting up signs and tables out on the front lawn. The house is cool, and the baby sleeps soundly on my lap. I find myself still singing to him long after he no longer hears me. It is a futile attempt at self-soothing. "So here we are," I thought, "emptying out a household....emptying out, drawers and closets, dreams and memories, emptying out the clutter in my brain."

Many visions entered my mind. Ike, their big, black mariah who would come bounding into the house, give a quick acknowledgment and then run to the back door to be let out to romp in the back yard with his "cousins", Sugar and Bear. I thought about two little girls who would bypass the family room and tun directly to "their" room. There they would hide from anyone who might object to their watching the cartoons they loved so much. Their Mimi never forbade that, leaving that job to the parents. Grandparents are created to indulge the grandchildren. How comfortable the girls are here.....how used to their routine, how much at home.

"Their lives will be changed now", I thought. "They are going miles away, transforming from real, palpable beings into voices on the phone and smiling snapshots", Gone will be the milk-and-honey cheeks to kiss, the silken hair that tickled the face with each hug. A yard sale closes a chapter in your life. It is difficult to see it as opening a new phase. I try not to dwell on things I will miss. but more on the opportunities that await in a new home for all of us, hopefully better than ever before. The big difference is that much will happen without our being there.

Poppop rarely mentions the imminent void. He is good-humored and philosophical, and says, "Children have to make their own way. You have to let go." He is attempting to convince himself of that. When he becomes teary, he turns away so I won't see. Of course he makes sense. The girls will miss us. Noah is a baby and, mercifully, won't know the difference. There is no part of this place he takes with him. "Empty everything out," I thought, "all the emotional cobwebs." Looking at various possessions transports me to other times, other occasions.....to first house, first child, first birthdays. All this three times over, a trio of memories. How lucky people are to be able, through their grandchildren, to relive happy events of their own children's youth.

What will happen now? Grandparents need to function as such: to read aloud, make up stories and poems, to hold, to nurture, to cheer their teams on to victory, to play "piggy", to serenade, to be called by their special names: Nana, Babba, Bubbie, Zaydie, Poppop and, yes, Mimi. I never knew a grandparent and never missed it until I became one. Then and only then did I learn the real value of unconditional love.



## PASSOVER CARROT RING

1 lb grated carrots  
1 apple, grated  
½ cup matzo meal  
3 tbsps potato starch  
1 egg  
½ tsp salt  
½ cup sugar  
2 tsps lemon juice  
1 tsp cinammon  
¾ cup liquid (broth or water)  
⅓ cup chopped nuts

1. Mix all ingredients, except nuts, in bowl.
2. Grease a ring tube.
3. Pour mixture into pan.
4. Sprinkle with chopped nuts.

Bake in 350 oven for 1 hour.

Let stand for 10 minutes and then turn out.

This can be made ahead of time and frozen.

## CARMEL MATZO CRUNCH



Easy to make and fun to eat.

Sue Rudo from "Taste of the Temple" cookbook:  
Temple Emanuel, Kensington, MD

4-6 unsalted matzo boards  
1 c unsalted butter  
1 c pure brown sugar  
6 oz (¾ c) chocolate chips  
½ c crushed walnuts, optional

Preheat oven to 375°.

Line a large cookie sheet with foil. Cover the foil with parchment. Line bottom of pan evenly with matzo boards, using what you need to fill any spaces.

Combine butter and brown sugar in a 3-quart, heavy-bottomed saucepan. Cook over medium heat, stirring constantly, until mixture comes to a boil. Continue cooking 3 additional minutes, stirring constantly.

Remove from heat and pour over matzo. Bake 12-15 minutes but make sure mixture is not burning – if it browns too quickly, remove cookie sheet, lower heat to 325° and continue baking. When done, remove from oven and sprinkle the top with chocolate pieces. Let stand for 5 minutes while chocolate melts. Spread over all the matzo and sprinkle with crushed walnuts. Let it set and harden. Break into pieces and store.
