PHYLLYS HUTT'S CORNER:

A VERY BIG GAP "TO FILL IN"

I have heard it said, "Thank G-d for the Orthodox......they sustain and preserve our religion."

Our family was Conservative, bordering on Reform. When my son Robert married Ruth 25 years ago, it was an Orthodox ceremony in every way. He told me that he had said to himself as Ruth was wending her way around him seven times, "I feel as if I am marrying into a new faith." Nevertheless, Ruth maintained her kosher kitchen and Rob learned to accept and embrace the changes in his life.

It is hard to believe that now my granddaughters are in their twenties, and Noah, the baby, the sassy. assertive. unique and oftimes behavioral problem child is now eighteen! Noah says it like it is. He sugar-coats nothing, facing facts, asking probing questions and arriving at profound and thought-provoking answers akin to someone far beyond his years. Always the wild child, always rebellious.but with humor and spirit. One simply cannot be angry with Noah. In sum, he is and always will be lovable.

However, in the recent past the picture has been slowly evolving. Noah began to join various programs in the Jewish community. When I would ask to speak to him on the phone, the answer was often, "Oh, you just missed him. He is at the Torah Center attending a class," or "He's at a seminar for Jewish youth this weekend." He became a veritable Boy Scout! The caterpillar had become a

butterfly! One day on the phone he told me he was saving to buy a new pair of tefillin. I said, "A new what?" He repeated his previous statement. "And for what will you use them?" I asked quizzically. "Why, to davven, of course." came the logical answer. I told him I thought I still had a little velour tefillin bag that had belonged to his Pop-Pop, and he could have it. When I told him it was still in the armoire, Noah exclaimed, "Oh, Mimi! Thank you, thank you, thank you...it means so much to me." One would think I had just told him he had won the Maryland Lottery or, at the least, a new Mercedes. I made sure that the little velour bag

with the treasure it held was mailed as quickly as possible to the willing recipient in Indiana. A few days later I received a call from Noah, telling me that he had received it and had it checked to make sure it was "kosher." Hearing the happiness in his voice, I felt as if I had done an honor to my late husband, who had used them last, and an honor to Noah who will make use of them in his future. I explained what a blessing it is to maintain that golden tie, that invisible connection that ties us together with our ancestors -- .L'dor, V'dor, one generation to another.

RECIPE CORNER

HAMANTASHEN

When we think of Purim, we think of Hamantashen; just as potato latkes go with Chanukah. When my children were young, I encouraged them to help with this Purim delicacy because the recipe was simple and fun to make and because I wanted to get them involved with our Jewish holiday traditions. I use the cookie dough recipe rather than the thin pie crust type of dough. Also, I found that in addition to the poppy seed (muhn) or prune filling, the children really preferred canned pie filling – either cherry or apple – to fill the three-cornered sweets.

Ingredients: 2 cups flour, 2 tsps. Baking powder, ½ tsp salt, ½ cup butter or margarine, 1 cup sugar, 1 egg, ½ cup water, 1 tsp. vanilla extract. Mix dry ingredients. Cream butter and sugar until 'fluffy.' Add egg. Add dry ingredients alternately with water. Add vanilla. Mix well. Roll out dough on floured surface to about 1/4" thickness. Cut out into 2 inch rounds. If you don't have a cookie cutter, you can use a glass or a jar cap. Put approximately a tablespoon of filling in the middle of each round. Fold up three sides to form a triangle. Place on cookie sheet and bake at 350° oven for about 45 minutes or until lightly browned. Cool on rack. Store in tightly covered metal container.

Managing Stress as a Senior

For older adults, prolonged stress can come from chronic illness, disability, or the loss of a close friend or spouse. These types of stressors are long term and can be difficult to deal with. Stress causes our bodies to release stress hormones, which over time, can take a negative toll.

According to the Yale School of Medicine studies show that long-term stress can damage brain cells, leading to depression. In fact, depression is one of the most dangerous effects of stress for older people with statistics indicating that nearly 2 million Americans over age 65 suffer from some form of depression.

If you have suffered a loss, are struggling with an illness or disability, or are having trouble dealing with a major transition or change in your life, know that symptoms of stress are normal and not a sign of weakness. The Yale School of Medicine offers these possible signs of stress in older people:

- •Fatigue
- •Loss of memory and concentration
- •Inability to fight off or recover from illness
- •Increased risk of chronic diseases such as heart disease and cancer
- •Symptoms of stress may include anxiety, sadness, trouble eating and sleeping, aches and pains, and weight loss.

As a first step, recognize the extent of your stress then try these simple coping strategies to work through it.

Take care of yourself. Get plenty of sleep and maintain a healthy diet. Avoid caffeine and alcohol.

Get regular exercise. Exercise releases hormones that help you fight off stress and depression.

Talk about your feelings. Sharing your feelings with friends and loved ones is the best way to get these emotions out in the open, where you can start to deal with them.

Learn relaxation techniques. Deep breathing, meditation, yoga, music, reading, or participating in activities that you enjoy, such as a walk around your neighborhood.

Put things in perspective. Accept that there are some things you just can't control—try to see the positive aspects of change and value humor. Solve whatever problems you can and let go of the rest.

Get professional help. If you feel you are struggling with stress or depression, talk with your doctor or feel free to let me know how I can help. Sometimes counseling or medication is needed to help us get back on track. Treatment is nothing to be ashamed of, and it usually does work.

It is im

portant to note that prolonged sadness, anxiety, loss of interest in life, and giving up activities you once enjoyed are not a normal part of getting older. They could be signs, not just of stress, but of depression. If you are struggling to deal with stress or depression, ask for help from your doctor or another member of your medical team.

Stress from the inevitable losses that come with aging are normal, but shouldn't define our lives. Call me and let's talk about ways you can deal with your stress. ~ Beth

DAVID" THE FILM; COMING TO GRIPS IN AMERICA

JRLW and Coming of Age program of the JCCGW cosponsor a look at the complexities of fitting into the modern world through the eyes of a Muslim boy mistaken for being Jewish in Brooklyn. The film "David" will be shown Thursday, March 22nd at 1:00 pm in the Auditorium of Clubhouse II. Tickets for \$6.00 per person, made out to JRLW, are available in the E&R office.

As the son of the Imam of the local Brooklyn mosque, eleven year-old Daud has to juggle the high expectations of his Father (Maz Jobrani) and his feelings of isolation and differenceeven from his peers in the Muslim community. Through an innocent act of good faith, Daud inadvertently befriends a group of Jewish boys who mistake him as a fellow classmate at their orthodox school, in the neighboring Jewish community. A genuine friendship between Daud and Yoav, one of the Jewish boys, and his family. Unable to resist the joy of a camaraderie that he has never felt before, David, as he is known to the kids, is drawn into a complicated dilemma inspired by youthful deceit and the best of intentions.

David is a street-level look at an eleven-year-old Muslim boy's struggle to fit in within his family, community, and wider world. What starts as an innocent mistake develops into an unlikely friendship. Two boys, both of conservative religious backgrounds, find commonality in each other. The film questions the boundaries of our cultures and religions and looks at how static and yet fluid these boundaries can be.

The film is not an attempt to provide answers to issues of prejudice, culture or religion, but rather to raise questions in a different tone; questions we hope can help us better understand a little bit about each other, and ourselves.

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
