

LEISURE WORLD REMEMBERS

March 1st and 2nd were memorable days for JRLW as fourteen residents came to the Crystal Ballroom to be interviewed by the staff of the United States Holocaust Memorial Museum for the project Leisure World Remembers. It was a very emotional day for all involved.

Ernie Pollak, Carl Goldstein, Irene Silver, Bertl Esenstat, Joachim Baer, Helen Schwartz, Eugene Miller, Romeo Fagiolo, Ellen Zweig, Alexander Tyson, Anita Graber, Frederick Firnbacher, Rita Penn and Barbara Firestone described their experiences during the Holocaust to the museum historian Ina Navazelskis, the Photo Archives Director Judy Cohen and members of the curatorial staff.

A computer was set up to enable entry to the museum's registry. People came by to inquire about friends and relatives who lived in Europe during the Holocaust period. Some of the interviewees and visitors brought memorabilia that could be placed in the archives of the museum. Photos of friends and family, documents, and other items brought back sad memories of family and friends long gone.

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SPOTLIGHT ON NA'AMAT: by Gladys Blank

In 1921, the women who came to <u>Israel</u> in

the <u>Second Aliya</u> from 1904 to 1914 expecting equality organized NA'AMAT, then called Moetzet Hapoalot (the Working women's Council), the first feminist movement in Palestine. Protesting a society in which women were relegated to the kitchens while men worked the land and built the country, the women's goal was to become full partners in the life of the Labor movement, the founding of the state and the future of the Jewish people.

Rachel Yanait Ben Zvi was one of those women. She had worked hard to establish a tree nursery in the middle of the desert, but a lack of water was threatening its existence. So Rachel wrote to her friend Sophie Udin in New York, requesting help. With six other American women, Sophie raised \$500 for the well and sent it to Rachel. These seven women formed NA'AMAT USA (then called Pioneer Women).

Thus began the partnership that linked American Jewish women with the women struggling to build a homeland and to find equality for themselves in Israel. Their work began with agricultural training schools and expanded into providing day care for children of working women and vocational training for women who wanted to work. Between 1934 and 1942. NA'AMAT USA's membership doubled to 10,000. The first two major funds, the Child Rescue Fund and the Building Fund were created in 1943 and 1944. With the establishment of the State of Israel in 1948, a tour department was inaugurated, as well as an Alivah department. In the 1950s, NA'AMAT became the first Jewish organization to provide services for Arab and Druze. In 1951, NA'AMAT USA participated in the first World Zionist Congress since the establishment of the Jewish State, and served thousands of new immigrants arriving in Israel. In the 1960s, established NA'AMAT Perpetual а Scholarship Fund, enabling Israeli women to pursue higher education.

In the 1970s legal aid bureaus and the Status of Women departments were established in Israel and Spiritual Adoption became a major fundraising activity in the United States. NA'AMAT entered the 1990s with an enormous agenda. Its activities included working with thousands of Soviet and Ethiopian immigrants pouring into the country; creating Mehad, the support program for single-parent families; establishing five Centers for the Treatment and Prevention of Violence in the Family, and building the Glickman Center, a shelter for battered women, in conjunction with the Tel Aviv municipality.

Today, NA'AMAT USA is part of the World Movement of NA'AMAT and, with chapters in 11 countries, is the largest Jewish women's organization in the world.

Phyllis Hutt's Corner I CAN'T HELP IT IF I TALK BACK!

I keep the TV on all the time. The sound is company for me. Half the time, I never know what program is on, but lately I have been paving particular attention to the commercials. It's all those chaps from Madison Avenue. They don't realize it, but they NEED me! So often spellings are wrong, "sizable" and "judgment" being two major offenders. My shout back: "How about those of us who would love to be a Size 10 to start with?" Often, there is reference to a Jewish synagogue or a Jewish rabbi. My remark is always, "There is another kind?" A sweet young thing tells us, "I have 'a stigmatism'". My dear, you have "an" astigmatism. The word starts with an "A". Did the Madison Avenue geniuses really okay that one?

The cautions for certain medications are endless. "Do not operate machinery or drive a vehicle. This could lead to dizziness, fainting, liver failure, kidney stones, swelling, itching and severe headaches." My retort must be, "But what does it help?" After that one, you get the following spiel: "If you or any member of your family have become ill, had a severe reaction or died as a result of taking Arsenica, call this 800 number immediately". Recipe Corner

Almond-Cranberry Rugelach

Dough: 1 ½ cups flour 2 tbsp light-brown sugar pinch salt ¾ stick unsalted butter, cut in pieces 3 oz cream cheese

Filling:
1 cup very finely chopped almonds
1 cup fresh or dried cranberries, finely chopped
2/3 cup light brown sugar
½ tsp cinnamon

Topping: 1 large egg, lightly beaten 2 tbsp granulated sugan ¼ tsp ground cinnamon

Mix dough ingredients together in processor until moist crumbs form. Transfer mixture to work surface and press together and knead until dough forms. Divide dough into thirds. On llightly floured surface, shape each portion into a ½ in thick disk. Wrap separately in plastic wrap Refrigerate 1 hour.

Heat oven to 350 degrees F. Line baking sheet with non-stick paper or foil.

Filling: Combine ingredients in a medium bowl. On floured surface roll 1 disk dough into a 9-inch circle. Spread 1/3 of filling over round; lightly press onto dough. Cut disk into 12 wedges. Roll up from wide edge to point. Repeat with remaining wedges. Place point side down about 2 inches apart on prepared cookie sheet. Brush rugelach with egg. Mix sugar and cinnamon and sprinkle over cookies.

Bake 21 to 14 minutes, until lightly browned. Cool on rack. Repet with remaining dough.

Rugelach can be made and stored in airtight container at room temperature for about 4 days.

Pierre didn't know where it came from, he only knew that it came and it helped in many ways. The money always arrived with a small short note that simply said, "Keep up the great cause, we will prevail," and was simply signed, "Manny."

Pierre didn't know who Manny was - nobody did! But this was during World War II when the Black Horror was sweeping Europe : the Nazi plague that was taking over most of the continent. Pierre was a leader of the French Resistance. He fought with groups of French citizens in the best way he could, by living within main society and leading bands of armed resistance against the Germans in clandestine activities. They would ambush German patrols, blow up German installations and sabotage Nazi operations in any way they could.


The Allies were good at providing arms and weapons, but the underground also needed money. That was a commodity that was very hard to come by during the war, especially when your country is occupied by an invading military force. And that's where Manny came in. He sent money, and he sent a lot of it. Manny was Emmanuel Goldenberg, born a Romanian Jew, who was now living in America . Manny had done very well in his life and he knew only too well what kinds of horrors were going on in his native Romania and the rest of Europe . Jews were being gassed and killed by the millions and he had to do something.

One thing he could do was use his good fortune to help the war effort. He had tried to join the Armed Forces, but he didn't qualify, so he did what he could. He sent money to where it was needed the most - to the resistance. Pierre was one of the leaders of the resistance. He controlled the action around the area of Normandy. He and his people were very instrumental in assisting the Allied invasion on D-Day by sabotaging Nazi forces moments before the actual invasion. Much of this was possible because of the money that arrived every month from Manny.

Pierre never knew who Manny was, only that he sent money for food, clothes, gasoline and many other important things.

But years later, we know who Manny was, that silent guardian angel of the French underground. He was one of the biggest stars in Hollywood, and a fine gentleman. It's a little known fact that a very important part of the success of the French underground came from a source they never knew: Emmanuel Goldenberg, or as you knew him, the very fine actor Edward G. Robinson.


