#### CONSIDERATIONS IN STRUCTURING NEW RELATIONSHIPS

Do you recall the scene in the movie "Ten Things I Hate About You" when the young lady must read her poem to the class about the guy she secretly adores? She begins with "I hate the way you talk to me, and the way you cut your hair," but ultimately concludes, "I hate it that you're not around, and the fact that you didn't call. But mostly I hate the way I don't hate you. Not even close, not even a little bit, not even at all."

As the poem reflects, being in a new relationship is not easy – it can even confuse you with conflicting feelings. You need to give the other person an opportunity to learn who you are and what you want and need. As I speak to Leisure World residents attending the Coming of Age in Maryland events, I find many people have questions about pursuing new relationships, with the opposite sex in particular.

For older people with many life experiences, expectations around dating have changed dramatically. A serious relationship today does not necessarily mean there will be a formal union. Nor does it imply living in the same house or sharing finances. Activities like spending time with family members, celebrating holidays and even intimacy need to be carefully reviewed and discussed to meet the expectations of each member of a couple.

Other issues an older adult needs to think about when dating today may include the varying reasons people seek new relationships. In forming a new couple, are the reasons of each person compatible? Some may wish to find love and fulfillment in caring for the needs of another or, conversely, in receiving care. Some may see being part of a couple as an easier way to socialize. In some cases, seniors wish to reduce feelings of loneliness and therefore may enter a relationship that brings companionship but not necessarily love.

The social workers in JSSA's Senior Services are highly trained and experienced professionals who can assist you in thinking through your relationships. They can help you carefully consider your options to meet your current and future needs.
