On November 10, at 7:30 pm, in the auditorium of Clubhouse II, we will observe the 75th anniversary of Kristallnacht—the night of broken glass.

Kristallnacht is considered the unofficial beginning of the Nazi anti-Jewish progroms, the start of the dreaded Holocaust.

Fred Firnbacher will be this year's keynote speaker. He will talk about his family's experience with "The Odyssey of a Torah."

Most of we Jews living in Leisure World have either family members or friends who were victims of the atrocity of the Holocaust. On November 10, we will come together to remember that which we shall never forget. On this night we shall be reminded to repeat to our children and our grandchildren what happened in Europe during the Holocaust so that they, too, <u>will</u> <u>never forget.</u>

What's Cooking in the Kitchen?

Chanukah Dish - Gluten Free Vegan Latkes!

Ingredients:

6 starchy white potatoes, peeled if you don't like the skins

1 medium onion (we like the sweet red ones) 1 large or 2 smaller zucchini

2 carrots, peeled

1/2 tsp sea salt, or to taste

¹/₄ tsp pepper

1/4 cup of organic non-GMO corn starch or potato starch

1 $\frac{1}{2}$ -2 cups Garbanzo bean flour (or brown rice flour)

Safflower oil or your favorite oil for frying

Prepare:

If using a food processor: use the grating blade to shred the potatoes, onion, zucchini and carrots. If shredding by hand, use a grater to shred all the potatoes, zucchini and carrots. Dice the onion as finely as possible.

Mix all vegetables in a large bowl. Add the starch of your choice and mix. Allow it to stand for a few minutes and get sticky from the moisture of the potatoes. Add the salt, pepper and flour and combine well. The mixture should get sticky and be able to hold together and form well. Use more or less flour to get to this consistency. Let mixture sit while heating up the oil.

In a non-stick skillet, add the oil for frying and heat on medium-high heat. Do not let the oil smoke. You want to have a good amount of oil in your pan because these babies love to suck up the oil and get crispy good.

While the oil is heating up, set your oven to warm to keep the latkes warm until you're ready to serve. Also have a plate with paper towels ready to soak up the oil when you first bring them out of the pan. Fry:

When the oil is hot and ready, take a large cookie scooper and scoop the latke mixture into the pan and press them flat with a spatula. If you don't have a scooper, just use your wet hands and roll mixture into medium balls and flatten with spatula. Fry the latkes on one side for about 4-5 minutes, or until they are golden brown. Flip and fry for another 4 minutes. We like ours a bit crispy. Reduce the frying time If you want them less crisp. Transfer to the paper towel covered plate and place in warm oven on baking sheet to dry them. Munch on a latke while completing, it takes some time.

Serve:

Serve warm with applesauce or sour cream, which can be tossed with fresh parsley and chives.



THE GALILEE ESKIMOS

The movie, "The Galilee Eskimos," will be shown in Clubhouse II on December 17, at 1:30 pm. Tickets are available at E&R.

One of the most charming films of the year, "Eskimos" is about coming out of a deep sleep and finding out that life is, indeed, worth living. It is a broad stroke of dignity and self-worth in a world of misplaced values. It is an acknowledgement of the beauty that life has to offer. It is caring while accepting the course of destiny.

An old Kibbutz isolated in the Hills of Galilee in Israel finds itself immersed in deep debt and threatened by lawsuits from bankers and creditors, threatening bankruptcy. On the evening prior to the arrival of the bailiffs, the great exodus begins. Men, women and children abandon their homes, taking with them all of their possessions. The sun rises over an abandoned and desolate kibbutz. No living soul can be seen. Twelve senior citizens awake in the kibbutz old-people's home to discover they have been deserted and left to fend for themselves. The group initially sinks into deep depression, but later begin to organize an effective communal unit. They begin to rebuild the kibbutz. The Galilee Eskimos is a movie about the latent power revealed when seniors are abandoned and betrayed by society and their relatives who leave them alone to determine their own fate.

Do you drive a car? Nowadays, growing numbers of older adults understand that one day it may not be practical for them to keep driving. They are concerned for their personal safety and the safety of others.

It is hard to put down the car keys and to rely on others to get us where we need to go. Many older adults are often in denial about the need to stop driving as they fear losing their independence and autonomy.

As you consider a time in your future that may not include your car, I hope you will consider these tips for a positive transition:

>Driving has been part of your daily life for many years. Yet your body is not the same as it was when you first started driving.

>The rituals of driving are well-ingrained and were established years ago. Give yourself time to adjust!

>Planning for and maintaining new ways of getting around can be rewarding.

>It is important to view your personal mobility transition not only as necessary but beneficial and even exciting!

>Rally family and friends for support.

>The most difficult aspect of a driving transition may be adapting to new ways of doing something that has become so second nature – driving yourself.

WHAT IS CHANUKAH?

Jews observe a holiday for eight days in honor of the historic victory of the Maccabees and the miracle of the oil.

The Hebrew word Chanukah means "dedication." In the 2nd century BCE, the Syrian-Greek regime of Antiochus sought to pull Jews away from Judaism with the hopes of assimilating them into Hellenism – Greek culture. Antiochus outlawed aspects of Jewish observance, including the study of Torah, which began to decay the foundation of Jewish life and practice. During this period many Jews began to assimilate into Greek culture, taking on Greek names and marrying non-Jews.

In response, a band of Jewish settlers took to the hills of Judea in open revolt against this threat to Jewish life. Led by Matitiyahu, and later his son Judah the Maccabee ("The Hammer"), this small band of Jews let guerrilla warfare against the Syrian army. Antiochus sent thousands of well-armed troops to crush the rebellion, but the Maccabees succeeded in driving the foreigners from their land.

Jewish fighters entered Jerusalem in December, 164 BCE. The Holy Temple was in shambles, defiled and desecrated by foreign solders. They cleansed the Temple and re-dedicated it on the 25th day of the Jewish month of Kislev. When it came time to re-light the Menorah, they searched the entire Temple, but only one small jar of oil bearing the pure seal of the High Priest could be found. Miraculously, the small jar of oil burned for eight days, until a new supply of oil could be brought.

From then on, Jews have observed a holiday for eight days in honor of this historic victory and the miracle of the oil. Today, the observance of Chanukah features the lighting of a special Chanukah menorah with eight branches (plus a helper candle), adding one additional candle each night. Other customs include spinning the dreidel (a top with Hebrew letters on the sides which stand for "a great miracle happened here."), eating "oily" foods like potato latkes (to recall the miracle of the oil) and jelly donuts and giving gifts and Chanukah gelt to children.
