AT THE OLYMPICS – WE REMEMBER THEM!

The IOC's refusal to permit a minute's silence for victims of the Munich terror attack 40 years ago has already provoked a protest. Now a French swimmer has found another method of commemoration. Fabien Gilot, a member of the gold medal-winning 4 x 100 team raised his arm in triumph to reveal a tattoo in Hebrew, saying, "I am nothing without them."



He explained that it was a tribute to his grandmother's Jewish husband, Max Goldschmidt, an Auschwitz survivor and a huge influence on his life. Despite the refusal of the International Olympic Committee (IOC) to hold a moment of silence in commemoration of the Israeli athletes who were murdered at the 1972 Games in Munich, their memories and legacies continue to live on, guiding and inspiring today's Jewish athletes.

On Sunday, approximately 30 members of the Italian Olympic team held their own moment of silence to remember the slain athletes outside the Israeli team's quarters.

While there was certainly no lack of anti-Israel or anti-Jewish sentiments at the Olympic Games -- whether in the form of a refusal to hold a Minute for Munich, boycotts, or Nazi salutes - there is also an encouraging wave of support from those who refuse to succumb to "politically correct" mantras delegitimizing the Jewish state.

American Jewish gymnast Aly Raisman reached the Olympics women's artistic

gymnastics finals, stunning spectators by grabbing one of the two spots in the allaround individual finals for the U.S., while performing a floor exercise routine to the tune of "Hava Nagila."

Gilot, along with the rest of the Jewish and Israeli athletes, continue to keep the memories of the Munich 11 -- and support for Israel -- alive and strong.


MEMBERSHIP

In cooperation with JRLW, Coming of Age in Maryland and its agency partners will present a **FREE** screening of the award-winning documentary *Consider the Conversation: How to Talk About End-of-Life Issues.* This one hour film will be shown on Monday, October 15, from 1:30 to 2:30 p.m. in Clubhouse II and is open to the entire Leisure World community. Come 30 minutes early to pick up information from resource tables outside the theater and stay after the film for a facilitated audience discussion and Q & A with a panel of local experts.

If you haven't seen the film, I encourage you to attend. If you have seen it, bring a family member or friend with you this time.

Consider the Conversation examines multiple perspectives on end-of-life care and includes information and experiences gathered from interviews with patients, family members, doctors, nurses, clergy, social workers and national experts from around the country. Consider the Conversation does not seek to hand down answers or tell you what to talk about. To the contrary, it encourages us to reflect about having or updating this important conversation with those we care most about. The film provides the opportunity or excuse to ask the questions all of us need to contemplate but often avoid out of fear or trepidation.

The producers have three goals for this film:

- 1. To change the current American attitude from one that predominantly views end of-life as a failed medical event to one that sees it as a normal process rich in opportunity for human development;
- 2. To inspire dialogue between patient and doctor, husband and wife, parent and child, clergy and congregant;
- 3. To encourage medical professionals, healthcare organizations and clergy to take the lead in counseling others. Our expert panel of hospice and palliative care providers will answer questions and provide information.


SHORT HISTORY OF JRLW

At our recent Executive Board Meeting the subject came up regarding the age of JRLW. A very interesting subject.

Sooo... a detective goes to work! It seems that 65 people in Building 1 of the Greens started the organization c. 1974. October, 2004, a 30th year celebration luncheon was held at Indian Spring Country Club chaired by Selma Warsaw. The price was \$36 per person and there were 400 people in attendance. Selma said it was the biggest event JRLW ever had. Herb Alexander was the president at the time and every past president was honored.

According to Marilyn Burchman, 24 years ago was the beginning Friday night and Saturday morning services, High Holiday services and special services. Additionally, our membership is 100. Doing the math from 1974 – JRLW is 38 years old.

Anne Mazor Cohen bought her apartment in 1975 and the name of Leisure World was Rossmoor. At that time, Friday night services were held in the Maryland Room. Harry Shooman was the president and he also conducted services. Ann became the first woman president and served three different times — 1985-1987, 1990-1992, 1999-2001 and emeritus in 2001-2002. She also said the name of Rossmoor was changed to Leisure World when the highrise buildings were built.



THERE'S NO PLACE LIKE HOME FOR THE HOLIDAYS

The holidays are coming! Another year! Another joy of experiencing G-d's blessings afforded us by living on His planet. What greater pleasure can life offer than to look into the beautiful, bright faces of our grandchildren? What greater sobering experience is there than seeing your daughter's graying hair or your son's long forehead? Of course, there can always be stumbling blocks in our pathway, but how would we gauge what is joyful without knowing a tear or two along the way? To quote my mother (and as I grow older, I do that frequently) "Kinderlach, we pay a high price for loving." But she never said what the price was.

When I was very young, I used to think she just talked to hear herself talk. I evolved into realizing she was very wise, and when I would engage in a teen-to-Mom debate, and tell her she was behind the times or didn't realize that, "This is 1953," or whatever, she would say, "Of course not, I know nothing. But I do know this: young I have already been...old you have yet to be."

Images of past holiday tables begin to creep into my mind just about this time of year. Aunt Clara and Uncle Max, who loved to sit at our table and always brought something to add to the feast...usually a large can of peaches or some industrial cleaning liquid. Not so strange, as Uncle Max used to deal in abandoned train cars and never knew what he was buying. The aunts and cousins who all claimed their kugel was the best, and how we ended up with at least three of them every year. The little ones yelling and the older ones saying, "Shrei nisht!." All of this, and more comes back...not to haunt me, but to bring back a warmth and contentment that won't happen again. Who can seat 35 people at a time like in the old

days when we had big dining rooms?
Who can lift 20 pounds of brisket in a pan?

As I write this, I find myself smiling, and, yes, even chuckling at the memories that come drifting by. I remember the ones who are no longer around the holiday table, and I appreciate all the more the loved ones still remaining. I know now the price we pay. It is in tears...not just sad ones, but many, many happy ones, too.

High Holidays -- Elsewhere in the Newsletter we have provided an Application for High Holiday tickets. The tickets cover the full range of High Holiday services and cannot be discounted even though some individuals may choose to attend only some services. However, it should be noted that no one will be turned away from the services. Anyone who faces financial difficulty should contact the Chairman of the Religious Committee (Allan Firestone, 301-598-7311) and appropriate arrangements will be made.

The application for High Holiday tickets asks if the applicant is a Kohan or Levi and if an Aliyah or Honor is desired. An Aliyah is given to those individuals who can read a portion of the Torah or who can recite the blessings upon being called to the Torah while someone else reads the appropriate portion. We need to know if a member is a Kohan or Levi because some readings of the Torah are reserved for them. An Honor is other than an Aliyah. It can be an English reading, an opening of the Ark, carrying or lifting of the Torah, etc. Those wishing to be given an Aliyah or Honor should contact Feldman (301-598-4417) Matty Conservative Services or Gerry Sommer (301-598-6789) for Reform Services.

Sukkot -- Sukkot is an eight-day harvest holiday that arrives during the Hebrew month of Tishrei.. The Sukkot Holidays will be celebrated this year on September 30 through October 7, to be followed on October 8 by Shemini Atzeret when Yiskor will be recited. We hope to have a minyan at the sukkah every evening at 7:00 pm and have the sukkah occupied every afternoon for those who wish to come and eat in the sukkah.

Sukkot is a reminder both of Israel's agricultural history and of the exodus from Egypt.

There are three major traditions associated with Sukkot:

- Building a sukkah
- · Eating in the sukkah.
- · Waving the lulav and etrog.

The sukkah is built during the days between Yom Kippur and Sukkot. Our sukkah will be on the parking lot of the Interfaith Chapel and will be decorated with the assistance of the local schoolchildren. It is considered a mitzvot to eat at least one meal in it.

Another custom on Sukkot involves the lulav and etrog. The etrog is a citron, while the lulav is made of three myrtle twigs (hadassim), two willow twigs (aravot) and a palm frond (lulav). During Sukkot, the lulav and etrog are waved together while reciting special blessings. Building the sukkah, decorating it, provisioning it with wine for kiddush and challah for the meal, arranging for siddurim to be available for services involves a lot of work. We need help in doing all that needs to done and to be available in the sukkah to greet visitors, especially on Sunday, October 7, when we invite the congregants of the Interfaith Chapel to visit with us and learn about Sukkot. We hope that we will have enough volunteers to "man" the sukkah and attend the evening services.

Elaine Schenberg (301-598-0079) has graciously agreed to chair the effort to organize the sukkah and she needs all the help she can get. Anyone who can help in any way, please let Elaine know.

RECIPE CORNER

TEIGLICH FOR ROSH HASHANNAH Something sweet for the New Year

1 cup honey__

1 cup sugar, ingredients for syrup

2 tsps. ginger__

3 eggs
2 tsps. sugar
2 tbsps. Oil
2 cups flour (approx.)
½ tsp. ginger
½ cup chopped nuts

Put ingredients for syrup in deep saucepan. Bring to a boil, then simmer while you make Mix the rest of ingredients the dough. together to form soft dough. Divide dough into three parts. Roll each part into a long narrow strip. Then roll between your floured hands to form a rope about 1/8 inch in diameter. Cut the rope into pieces about ½ inch long. Repeat with other two parts of dough. Bring syrup mixture back to a slow boil and carefully drop each piece of the dough into the syrup. (I use a slotted spoon and drop several pieces at a time into the syrup.) Cover pot and lower the heat. Do not uncover for ½ hour. Then use wooden spoon to turn the mixture carefully, bringing the pieces on the bottom to the top. Cook until the pieces are golden brown and sound hollow. Test by breaking one open. It should be crisp and not soft. Now turn off the heat and add ½ cup boiling water. Stir and allow to cool a little, but while still warm, pour into containers. Do not cover until cool.
