RELIGIOUS COMMITTEE

The Religious Committee is working hard to ensure that our High Holiday services are well organized and go off in order. In another portion of this edition of the Newsletter we list the schedule of High Holiday services for the Reform and Conservative congregations.

As in the past several years, we are fortunate to have Rabbi Gary Fink and Cantor Michael Kravitz conduct the Conservative services while Rabbah Arlene Berger and Cantor James Perlmutter will conduct the Reform services. Both sets of Clergy had been with us and were very favorably received.

Tickets for the High Holiday services are required and requests for them should be directed to Milli White. It should be noted that tickets are not required for members of the Military or those who wish to attend Yizkor services only. We will not turn away any member of JRLW who wishes to attend the full services but has financial difficulties. Anyone who cannot afford tickets should contact the Religious Vice-President. Also, members who wish to invite their grandchildren to services will be able to do so on the second day of Rosh Hashanah.

Cantor Mike Kravitz is already assigning Torah and Haftorah readings and will be happy to hear from any volunteers who wish to read portions of the Torah or chant a Haftorah. Anyone who wishes to be called up to the Torah or who would like to participate in other portions of the services should contact Janet Lazar and/or Matty Feldman for Conservative Services or Gerry Sommer for the Reform Services.

Bob Fenichel will be in charge of setting up and tearing down the Succah. Unfortunately, Elaine Schenberg, who has done an outstanding job of organizing the services in the past, has problems with her voice and cannot use the telephone. She would be grateful for assistance with soliciting volunteers to keep the Succah open.

FRIDAY EVENING SHABBAT SERVICES

JRLW holds Friday evening Shabbat Services on the first Friday of each month.

In the afternoon, a crew comes and sets up a delicious Oneg for us to share following Services. Another crew comes in and transforms the Interfaith Chapel into a Jewish sanctuary. As you enter Services, someone is there to greet you and to hand you a book and a pamphlet, D'Var Shabbat.

The Services are short--an hour or less. Rabbi Fink leads a lovely service and gives a short talk on the Torah Portion, usually relating it to current affairs. Ed Laskin leads the choir in songs we are all familiar with even if we do not read or understand the Hebrew.

The problem is that the Services are poorly attended. What a waste of time and effort. I have heard our members complain that they do not know anyone in JRLW outside of their immediate circle of friends. Well, here is your chance to remedy that. Come to Services and say hello to at least two people you do not know. You will be surprised at how friendly we are.

It's a win-win situation. You get to see the Shabbat candles lit, take part in our Services, hear Rabbi Fink's thoughtful talks and enjoy socializing with new and old friends while noshing on delicious treats. And we get to see you at Services, helping to fill up the pews.

CANTOR'S CORNER

As the High Holy Days are just around the corner, many of you will be in shul and will be looking forward to hearing the melodies associated with the Holy Days (along with the blasting of the shofar). Probably the main melody to which most people look forward is the KOL NIDRE. It is actually chanted prior to the evening service and deals with the possible renunciation of some vows.

The Kol Nidre melody has appealed to a number of non-Jews as well. Two famous non-Jewish entertainers whose names are familiar to all of you -- Perry Como and Johnny Mathis -- recorded KOL NIDRE on religious music albums each made in the 1950s. But the interest in using the KOL NIDRE melody goes back much farther than those two entertainers' recordings. The melody was used by two very famous German composers of the 19th century. So in keeping with the tradition of my JEOPARDY! columns, let me give you the category and the answer, and YOU try to come up with the question.

STARTS WITH "B"

THESE TWO 19TH CENTURY NON-JEWISH GERMAN COMPOSERS WHOSE SURNAMES START WITH "B" EACH USED THE KOL NIDRE MELODY IN ONE OF THEIR WORKS

You have 30 seconds.

The question: Who are Ludwig van Beethoven and Max Bruch?

Beethoven used the melody in his String Quartet #14 in C-sharp minor that was completed in 1826, the year before he died. It was a work written in seven movements, with no break in between the movements, and the piece runs about 40 minutes. The Kol Nidre theme is used in the sixth movement at about 31 minutes into the piece. If you don't have the piece in your collection but would like to hear how Beethoven used the melody, you can find it on the internet. Plug Beethoven String Quartet #14 into your browser and go

to Afiara Quartet and run forward to the 31:00 minute mark.

Max Bruch sounds like he SHOULD be Jewish since his surname sounds like a variation on the Hebrew word "baruch (blessed)." But he isn't. He was a Protestant who became friendly with the chief cantor of Berlin, Cantor Abraham Jacob Lichtenstein, and Cantor Lichtenstein's family. Cantor Lichtenstein had a wonderful relationship with non-Jewish composers and willingly shared Jewish folk melodies with them. Bruch's piece is an Adagio on 2 Hebrew Melodies for Cello and Orchestra with Harp and was completed in Liverpool, England, in 1880. Bruch came back to Berlin where the work was published in 1881. It is an essential part of the repertoire of any world-class cellist. On a personal note, once the Rosh Hashanah services are completed, I pull out a CD of the Bruch work with Janos Starker as the cellist, and put it on automatic replay in my CD player. Its total length is about 10 minutes, so I can listen to it over and over. I know it's not a Jewish piece, per se – Bruch never intended it be one. It is, however, a lovely piece whose musical beauty has a calming effect, especially as Erev Yom Kippur approaches. Should any of you want to listen to it online. you can find two wonderful versions with Jacqueline Du Pre. Type JACQUELINE DU PRE KOL NIDRE into your browser, and you will find YOU TUBE versions available. In one she is accompanied by Gerald Moore on the piano and in the other by a full orchestra. Take your pick; you can't go wrong with either one.

Let me wish each of you a SHANAH TOVAH with sincere hopes for a joyous holiday season and a wonderful year in 5776.

"You just don't see this anywhere else." That's what 30-something and new father, Andy Kirschner, says when asked why he is involved in Jews United for Justice (JUFJ). Heads nod around the room, echoing the sentiment. One nod comes from 20-something Rachel Metz, a single unaffiliated Jew, and another comes from 60 something, Fran Rothstein, a synagogue member and retired consultant.

What you just don't see anywhere else but JUFJ is this: Jews of all ages, affiliated and unaffiliated, secular and religious, all coming together to act on shared Jewish values that compel us to pursue justice for our community. Our older members appreciate the energy of younger members, and our younger members appreciate the wisdom of older members. We all appreciate each other's shared passion for social justice and how that passion is rooted in our Jewish identity.

We know many Jews share our dream for a more just world and hope for the opportunity to do something substantive and lasting towards those dreams. Jews United for Justice leads our community to act on our shared Jewish values by pursuing justice and equality in our local community. JUFJ provides Jews with an opportunity to weave together Judaism and activism and creates an intergenerational, pluralistic community in which to explore and strengthen commitments to both.

At JUFJ, we also win. In other words, we have a track record of making positive change in our community. JUFJ has played key leadership roles in protecting critical safety net services, winning same-sex marriage equality and immigrant education rights, and raising the minimum wage in Montgomery County and across the state of Maryland.

Last month, the Montgomery County Council held its vote on Paid Sick Leave and cemented a victory we, and our partners in the Working Matter coalition, earned for the over 97,000 workers who do not have paid sick days at work. Together, we passed a law ensuring that no one in Montgomery County is forced to choose between their health and their job.

JACKY'S STORY - MY TIME WITH THE IDF

The year was 1989. My sister Cookie talked me into going to Israel with her to volunteer in a hospital setting. We ended up working with the Israel Defense Force, not in a hospital, but on an army base. I consider it to be the greatest adventure of my life.

We boarded the plane at BWI early in the morning. After several plane changes and stopovers, we landed in the El Al Wing of Heathrow Airport in London. Our next stop was Ben Yehudi Airport in Israel. There we were greeted by young girls who were dancing around us and making us feel welcome to Israel.

We were taken to an army base where we would stay for the next four weeks. Our goal was to relieve active members of the IDF from doing menial work. We were given one-size-fits-all green uniforms. Some of the things that were planned for us were stuffing duffle bags, latrine duties, kitchen duties, dusting rifles and boxes of ammunition and odd jobs as were assigned. There were about thirty in our group, from college kids to seniors. We were given army food. One morning, after being tired of the same breakfast day after day, I asked for some challah and made French toast for our whole group. Needless to say, the French toast was really appreciated.

When we were not busy with assignments, we were taken by bus to see different places of interest. Each bus had a member of the IDF carrying an AK 47 for our protection. We went to the Wall, to Masada and to the shuok. We went to David's Springs and to Tel Aviv.

Of all the things I did and saw during my four weeks as a volunteer, one image stands out the most: The Wall. I didn't know what to expect, but when I approached the Wall, I felt overwhelmed at the sight of it and by the people who were praying and others who

were sticking notes into its cracks. I, myself, wrote a note and placed it in one of the cracks. I fully believe that when prayers are put into the Wall they will be heard.

When it came time to leave Israel, after our four-week tour had ended, we each received a certificate of honor. That certificate hangs on the wall in my home. Would I go there again? YES! I consider it the greatest adventure of my life.

1 tsp baking powder

1 ½ cups sugar

2 tsps cinnamon

t tsp nutmeg

1 cup cooking oil

3 beaten eggs

1 can apple pie filling (1cup)

Place dry ingredients in large mixing bowl. Mix until blended. Make a well in the middle of the dry ingredients and add the oil, eggs and apple pie filling. Mix only until blended. Bake in a greased bundt pan at 350° for approximately 50 minutes.



APPLE CAKE

4 - 5 apples, sliced thin

5 tbsps sugar

2 tsps cinnamon

Set aside.

Beat together:

4 eggs

1 cup oil

2 ½ tsp vanilla

2 cups sugar

½ cup orange juice

Add gradually:

3 cups flour

3 tsp baking powder

½ tsp salt

Pour into well-greased bundt pan, and layer batter, apples, batter, apples, batter. Bake 1 hour. 20 minutes in 350° oven.



CARROT SOUFFLE'

This recipe comes from Piccadilly Restaurants in the South. A great holiday treat!

1½ lb. carrots, sliced 34 cup (1 ½ sticks) butter or margerine

3 eggs, well beaten

1/4 cup flour

1 ½ tsp baking powder

1 ½ cups packed brown sugar

1/4 tsp cinnamon

1 tsp vanilla

1 tsp nutmeg

Preheat oven to 350°. Lightly grease 1 ½ quart souffle' dish. Set aside. Cook carrots in boiling water to cover for 15 minutes or until tender. Drain. Place carrots in food processor and process until smooth. Place into large mixing bowl. Add rest of ingredients and mix well. Spoon into souffle' dish. Bake for one hour or until lightly set and browned. Makes 8 servings.

HONEY CAKE

3 1/2 cups all-purpose flour

1 tablespoon baking powder

1 teaspoon baking soda

1/2 teaspoon salt

4 teaspoons ground cinnamon

1/2 teaspoon ground cloves

1/2 teaspoon ground allspice

1 cup vegetable oil

1 cup honey

1 1/2 cups granulated sugar

1/2 cup brown sugar

3 eggs

1 teaspoon vanilla extract

1 cup warm coffee or strong tea

1/2 cup fresh orange juice

1/4 cup whisky

1/2 cup slivered or sliced almonds (optional)

Preheat the oven to 350°F. Lightly grease 9-inch angel food cake pan.

In a large bowl, whisk together the flour, baking powder, baking soda, salt, and spices. Make a well in the center and add the oil, honey, sugars, eggs, vanilla, coffee, orange juice, and whisky.

Using a strong wire whisk or an electric mixer on slow speed, combine the ingredients well to make a thick batter, making sure that no ingredients are stuck to the bottom of the bowl.

Spoon the batter into the prepared pan and sprinkle the top of the cake evenly with the almonds. Place the cake pan on 2 baking sheets stacked together and bake until the cake springs back when you touch it gently in the center. Bake for 60 to 70 minutes. This is a liquidy batter and, depending on your oven, it may need extra time. Cake should spring back when gently pressed.

Let the cake stand for 15 minutes before removing it from the pan. Then invert it onto a wire rack to cool completely.

note: If you prefer not to use the whisky, replace it with orange juice or coffee.



Baked Apples with Walnuts, Honey and Cinnamon

1 tsp ground cinnamon

4 tbsp honey

2 tbsp brown sugar

4 oz walnuts, roughly chopped

4 apples

juice of 1 lemon

Heat the oven to 375 degrees. Mix the chopped nuts with the cinnamon, brown sugar and honey in a bowl. Next, you will want to core the apples-scooping out the insides so you have enough room to stuff in the nut mixture. You will also want to score (make shallow cuts) the apples around the middle. Place the apples in a baking dish.

Fill the apples with the nut mixture, which works best if you spoon a little in the apple and carefully use your fingers to pack the apple full.

Bake the apples 30-40 minutes until the apple is golden and soft. If the apple starts to brown before it is ready, you can cover it with foil. This dish is delicious served with yogurt or cream.

AUTUMN CRISP

3/4 cup plus 1/2 tbsp flour

1/2 cup brown sugar

1/2 cup old fashioned oats

1 tsp cinnamon

1 stick cold butter, in chunks

1/2 cup pecans, chopped

2 1/2 pounds apples peeled


1/2 cup dried cranberries

1/4 cup maple syrup

For the topping, put 3/4 cups flour, sugar, oats, cinnamon and butter in food processor and pulse to form moist clusters. Mix in pecans.

Cut apples into 1/2 inch chunks and put them in a buttered 9 1/2 inch, 2-quart pie pan. Add cranberries, maple syrup and 1/2 tbsp flour; mix. Scatter on topping. Place pan on a parchment-lined baking sheet.

Bake at 375° for 40-50 minutes. Serve warm, at room temperature, or chilled.




